Squirrel Smarts

Remember last month's news of squirrels outwitting rattlesnakes? Those wiley little critters are at it again. Researchers in the New England area have observed squirrels pretending to hide food. They did so in response to being watched. They do it in order to fool thieves. They did this procedure not only when other squirrels were around, but also when they saw the researchers watching them.

The Rodent Family

The rodent family includes little mice and their bigger cousin the rat. But they have even bigger relatives such as the Pakarana in South America that can weigh as much as 33 pounds: the guinea pig like Capybara that can reach 130 pounds. If you lived in South America four million years ago you would have seen a much bigger version of the Capybara rodent that weighed almost 3000 pounds. Fossils of this creature were recently found in Uruguay by an amateur palaeontologist. Imagine having a guinea pig that big as a pet!

Flowering Palm Trees

Did you know some palm trees produced flowers? No? That's okay because there are very few palm trees that do and until a Frenchman who runs a cashew farm on the beautiful island of Madagascar found some, no one on Madagascar had ever seen one either. This particular palm tree grows for up to 50 years and reaches up to 60 feet in height. It blooms only one time in its life, putting out hundreds of little white flowers on top of the tree. Each one of the flowers can turn into a little berry like fruit with seeds.

The Hunt Restarts By: KayBee

In Salem, Massachusetts, 1692, 14 innocent people were accused of practicing witchcraft and were hung. This event has always been remembered as horrible, and we had always hoped that the mistake made by the Puritans would never be repeated. In UIGE, Angola, Congo, and the Congo Republic, there has been an ongoing problem for many years now which has the same outline of the past.

The children of these regions watch for their lives because there have been over 300 hundred children accused of witchcraft and many who have died. Children at just the age of 10 and 12 can be accused, and many are instantly killed, put into institutes where they slowly die from disease or starvation, abandoned, or abused. Many children are killed merely out of fear they will become a witch when they get older.

There have been about 432 children roaming the streets, shunned, because of accusations that they have no control over. Parents who couldn't take care of their children any longer would simply make up an excuse to relieve their 'burdens' and many others caught onto this trend, therefore, starting this unfortunate situation. Even some local churches have shoved the children away, although there are some that take them in.

The number of children being exploited have began to drop recently. Many people and organizations are taking a stand and trying to resolve the situation. Funding has helped by increasing the amount of shelter for starving, abandoned, or abused children as well as spread the knowledge of the situation among the world surrounding UIGE. The United Nation's Children Fund has helped a lot with the children and many abandoned children as well. Many churches around the area have taken notice, are making major impact on the people of Angola, and are making incredible changes.

Working the Hunt Restarts

Around the times of 1692 in Salem, Massachusetts was very crazy and dangerous time. Many people lost their lives to the label of 'Witch'. There was much ignorance going on about Paganism, especially Witchcraft, and the populace assumed the worse. Superstitious people took over and chaos ruled. The people of Angola, thought it to be a solution to a problem, it has way too many characteristics of the late 1690's here in the U.S..

Read up on the past situation in Massachusetts as well as the situation going on in Angola. Compare the two using a large venn diagram on poster board.

Make a form of media (flier, Power Point presentation, movie, etc...) to inform people of the situation, as well as things they can do to help out. Do as much as you can to spread it to people you know or local places.



Simple Symbols

Heart



Firstly, it has symbolized the center of existence since the ancient Egyptians. In ancient Mesopotamia where people were offered to the Gods, it was the heart that was considered the gift because of its importance to life itself.

Secondly, it is the seat where emotions sit. This belief of the symbol is not on a physical level, but more on an emotional level. Today it can be found in notes, cards, and on special days where the feelings it portrays is said to be strongest.

Ancient Egypt Heart Weight

Today the 'mental size' of the heart is said to be a measurement of the person. This idea may have came from an ancient Egyptian ceremony that was held after someone died. In the ceremony the heart of the one that died would actually be weighed against a feather of Maat (the symbol of truth) in the Hall of Judgement.

When Dreaming about the Heart, remember that it may be referring to the physical or psychological center. If it is strong, it is showing central power.

General population can view as a spectator.

Children being involved in celebration is a new thing to the Pagan scene. Today's children will aid in the education of future generations. Parents are just beginning to explore different ways to involve children without disturbing or losing the sacredness of the ceremony.

Do not view this as a 'chore'. Instead, take it as an opportunity to pave the way for children of the future. Don't keep quiet about your experiences while at any Pagan function. Your voice on the subject will be greatly welcomed because it will aid in making all Pagan gathering suitable for family members of all ages. This is also a chance for you to be among the first generation of children to visit or participate in a freely given Pagan ceremony or ritual.

Things To Share After Attending

- parts of the Ritual or Ceremony you didn't like
- ideas on how kids could occupy themselves during the dry or boring times
- what parts you feel would be appropriate for kids to do during the ritual or ceremony
- things you didn't understand
- parts or certain times that frightened you
- parts you want to learn more about
- questions you have about anything you saw, heard, or did during the ritual or ceremony

Things To Ask Before Attending

- what is actually going to go on
- find out what is to be expected of you
- talk about what you will wear and how others will be dressed
- find out where it will take place (inside or outside)
- discuss who will be there so you will know how many people will be there
- ask if it is going to be public (meaning there will be people sitting around watching) or if it will be exclusive (where only Pagan's participating will be there so you can prepared mentally
- ** Although the answers to these questions really aren't important in your journal or diary, how you feel about going before and after you know all the answers would be.

After you have your own rituals and ceremonies, you will understand them and be able to help fill the gap between kids and adult roles in them. Be sure to share with adults your ideas!

There are about 65 species of the ash. They can be found all over the world. It is a member of the olive family. The tree is hardy, grows fast and native to northern temperate zone. Ash Buggy Problems

Meet the ash trees worse enemy; the Emerald Ash Borer. They made their way to America on some firewood in 2001 from overseas where they don't bother the native trees.

These small beetles lay eggs that hatch into larva which eats into the ash tree. They will continue to bore into the tree leaving open wounds and cutting into the tree inners that are used to carry water and other essentials to the tree. When the larva



leaves, the hole is used by another adult to lay a new egg in; that egg's larva will bore in deeper. Eventually the tree will starve to death and die off because the small beetles have blocked all of it's supply routes.

Studies are still taking place to see if there is a tree friendly pesticide that can be used to deter or kill the beetle. Check your state and see when the Emerald Ash Borer first came there. Spend some time researching the bug and/or seeing if you can find some and help the tree as much as possible.



Triad's are simply a topic and three supporting statements to teach or explain it. For many years Triad's have been used to inform people of different things. The Welsh triad's for instance teach folklore, mythology, and history.

The Celtic triad leans more towards teaching life's lessons and is usually represented in a bard like (storytelling) way. When times change so does the wording of the triad, however, the meaning is something that will stay the same. There are so many of triad's written over time that you could almost have a new one for each day of your life.

Do some research of your own and find a list of traids and choose one to study in depth. Look up the words you don't know, figure out how things are connected together and get a good understanding of the lesson it is teaching. When you understand it you may want to take a shot at writing your own.

The Celtic Scribe

Today there are great artists that reflect the Celtic world for the many Pagan based religions of today. The steps taken to get to this simple world of Celtic knots, crosses, and intricate design is very interesting.

The journey started back with abstract and floral symbols put together in very special ways. These symbols formed intricate designs that could be found in jewelry, armor and other everyday metal objects found in the Ancient Celtic world.

The individuals who made these wonderful things were very respected. They had a design which not only reflected them as a society but left room for individual design aspects. Things they made can be found throughout the world which shows that they were in demand by everyone.

The Christians took over the ancient Pagan world and it changed into a different kind of world. This is when the ancient artistans entered their most challenging job; the Christian Scribes. The Scribes job was to document Christian words and great works. The Pagan values did not change in their new Christian environment.

The ancient Celts didn't document anything about their world, the only traces of their world can be found in their art work; this is something that the Scribes carried on. Many of the sacret texts the Christians hold true have many images that show Pagan values.

Although some images are easy to see the Pagan touch in them like the one's with images of animals held sacred by the Cetlic religions, other images are more difficult to understand. In this aspect the ancient scribes kept their belief of 'no documentation' true. Take the time to look at some of the great images that the Celtic scribe left behind to the Pagan's of the future. See Some books to take notice in would be the Book of Kells, the Book of Armagh, the Book of Dimma.

Although you can find many places that 'show' or 'teach' you how to draw some of these intricate designs, it is best not to use them. Every individual needs to do things from within for them to be real. Don't worry too much about doing things the way you feel they should be; mistakes are what causes things to advance and/or adds a touch that could have never been reached any other way. Make your own step in this occupation that has been around for longer than most.

Make a journal or BOS entry showing your enterpretation of some of these images. Incorporate some of their art work, or your own similar, into some of your writings on a regular basis to aid in keeping the ancient Pagan tradition alive.

Taking A Walk

As often as possible take a walk being sure to bundle yourself up. Even though the ground looks like it is asleep look for the small signs of it's preparation for the upcoming season. Tomato Project

You will be watching how spring prepares for life in the warmth of your own home by growing a tomato from a seed. All during the project take notice of how growth is going on and the weather outside and remember that what is happening to your tomato is also happening to the world outside.

Preparation: go to this site and see what the projected date is for the last freeze in your area:

Next go to the calendar and move ahead 2 weeks after that date—this will be the date you need to plant your seeds. Next you will go back and count from the last day of frost back 6-8 weeks. This is the date you will begin your plants using the directions below:

Directions

Take a bite out of a tomato. Take a look at it and notice at how complicated the inside of the tomato is like. Imagine that this large complicated thing was made from only one of the small seeds you see inside it. When done take out around 5 seeds to use in your project.

Make a hole in the bottom of a Styrofoam cup and fill it with potting soil then tap it down on the floor or counter to get out the air. Use water to dampen the soil being sure not to soak it.

You will plant your seeds in this soil so the dirt barely covers the seeds then place the cup into a plastic bag that has an opened top.

You will sit the starter in a warm location away from direct sunlight. Do not let the dirt dry out, if it looks as though it is drying use a spray bottle to spray it lightly.

After 5-10 days you should see the start of plants. When they come up you will need to separate them and place in a different Styrofoam cup then move to the window sill. If you get more than one put only one in each cup being careful not to rip their roots up.

Each day you will need to turn your tomato starter plant around so the sun will hit all sides evenly.

On the scheduled day plant your tomatoes which will be either in a larger very deep pot or outside in your own garden. Be sure to watch and nuture your plants with water and moving them to get the most sunlight on a regular basis.

Be sure your tomatoes are ripe before picking. Once picked enjoy a gift from nature!

Pagan Touch Of Class: Field Trips

Pagan field trips are not totally out of the question; however, not many people think about doing them. Although it may not be something advertised, there are many ways to take Pagan field trips and/or add a Pagan touch to the field trips you already have scheduled. Hopefully some of these ideas will help find a few Pagan field trips, to make your home-school more rounded.

Pagan Focused Field Trip Ideas:

- Call your local new age store to schedule a tour for your family or home school group. This would be a great experience for both you and the store and if a tour is not possible, go there yourself and browse the aisles together while discussing all the different items for sale. Talk about their meanings and/or uses, as well as the different paths within the Pagan spectrum that use them
- Contact individuals who supply you, your family, or area with Pagan type products and ask for a demonstration. They may even come to a place of your choice to give it to you and let you make your own sample as well.
- Pagan-topic day workshops in your area are appropriate for children. These workshops can sometimes be called in advance and they can set up a small group workshop for the younger home school crowd for only a small fee.
- Local Pagans or Pagan groups within your chosen path would be more than willing to arrange a field trip experience for the
 younger crowd. You could also call people who are in a higher position to meet your family or small group, to discuss religious topics and/or demonstrate things.
- Set up a demonstration and or workshop with your local divination, palm reader, fortune teller, or horoscope writer. If you live in a large area, setting up more than one per subject might prove for a nice project on comparisons.
- Contact your local Drum or Bard circles for a field trip. These are one of the more fun field trips and offer a lot for all ages. These field trips do not have to be a one time experience; they can offer something fresh each time they are contacted.
- If you live near a reservation, a visit is definitely in order. You can see the absurd amount of demonstrations on many Pagan focused topics. This is also a great opportunity to get a glimpse of a strong Pagan culture that has adapted to today's world without losing their Pagan foundation.
- Visiting a local or semi-local Pagan based facility (such as a church or school) or arranging for a tour, demonstration, or just a question/answer session could be a great field trip. If the facility is dedicated to a different path than you are, simply look at the area of interest instead of the actual teachings it relays (or you could simply learn more about your Pagan neighbors).
- Contact individuals that have jobs (for example: hand fasting) or positions (such as a clergy) within the Pagan religions. These people offer great workshops on their chosen work or position, as well as within the Pagan religion. They are also easy to contact, usually very eager to share, and very versatile as to time and place. Interviews are also an idea here. This would be nice for a school project; also, for the older crowd who interested in a pagan based job.

Subject Field Trips with a Pagan Touch

Art– Visiting an art museum to find signs of Paganism in the past always brings fun. Take a notebook, or a camera if allowed, to document the things you find. If going in a group, getting together afterward to compare notes or pictures can be a lot of fun.

Science– Planetariums put on great shows during holiday seasons to show astrological stories and many reflect the Pagan view.

Geography– Visiting the 'birth place' of your chosen path may be a reality for some; however, not everyone will be able to make such a large trip across the ocean. A trip to a famous, well-known Pagan historical landmark or place might be more realistic for others. Some research in your local area most often will reveal special Pagan significance and a field trip possibility.

History— History museums cover many different cultures and with them come the beliefs they follow. What a great place to show the blooming or devoted Pagan practices of the past. This is also a great place to learn about the different paths within the Pagan realm. **Music**— A trip to a larger music store that has world instruments always makes a fun field trip. No tour will be needed; however, taking a book or report on world Pagan instruments would be nice. View, and possibly take a chance to play these instruments. Experiencing instruments played now or in the past by Pagans is always a great treat and can even be inspiring.

Civics— Visiting Pagan topic trials or even the court where a well-known Pagan trial took place can be a treat. Contacting a lawyer, judge, or other important figure in the judicial court for interview or discussion on Pagan trials, would be a great field trip as well.

When a specific place cannot be found for an actual Pagan field trip, you can always resort to areas of interest for Pagans. Some of these ideas might be digging for crystals, or star gazing. The idea's for this type of field trip are endless and lots of fun!

Don't forget the movies and IMAX theaters that offer Pagan related movies. The documentaries that will be the most informative work well for all ages as long as a coloring page or journal can be used during the film itself.

Faith Focus: Hinduism

Hinduism is a religion that has been around since 4000 BCE and the third largest religion of today. It is one of the few religions where there is no founder or teacher, instead a collaboration of many different people and contributions. The actual name 'Hinduism' is used for this religion by people in North America. Other names that are used for this religion is Sanatana Dharma and Vaidika Dharma. The religion itself is also a very controversial religion to this day. The religion itself could, if you dig deep enough, be classified as a Pagan and a monotheistic religion, however, the general populous consider it to be Pagan. The Hindu religion has a strong belief in reincarnation until one reaches enlightenment. To reach enlightenment you have to pass Samsara by earning higher level rebirths through positive karma.

The people following Hinduism are very peaceful serious people. Hindus are not necessarily passive people, they do believe in self defense as well as organized fighting (military) however with both there are a set of rules they must follow which make sure they do things fairly and with only skill. They live by guidelines and are careful not to cross them. Meditation and/or Yoga is heavily practiced. There are many different kinds of religious activities used by Hindus; daily devotions, public rituals, and puju (a ceremonial dinner for a diety).

Main Worship Branches of Hinduism

Vaishnavaism—The view that Vishnu is the main diety.

Shivaism—The view that Shiva is the main diety.

Rural Hinduism—The view that local village or nature diety is the main one.

Hindu Moral Code

Hindu moral codes are a written collection of books called DHARMA SUTRAS.

Hindu moral codes are the integral part of Hinduism and they come under the big umbrella called DHARMA. It is difficult to translate the word DHARMA. Some of the codes are:

AHIMSA (NON-KILLING)
SATHYA (TRUTH)
DHARMA (DUTY)
KARUNA (COMPASSION)
VIRYA (FORTITUDE)
DAMA (SELF-RESTRAINT)
SAUCHA (PURITY)

Durga the Invincible

Durga is an incarnation of Devi, the Mother Goddess. The Goddess Durga is considered by Hindus to be the mother of Ganesha, Kartikeya, as well of Saraswati, and Lakshmi. She is thus considered the fiercer demon-fighting form of Shiva's wife, Goddess Parvati.

Durga is the Goddess warrior of protection

The Hindu Goddess Durga, manifested when evil forces threatened the very existence of the Gods.

In order to destroy the demons the Gods came together and each of them offered their divine radiance to her creation forming the parts of Durgas body. She is said to be exquisitely beautiful. She has three lotus-like eyes, and ten powerful arms, lush hair with thick radiant curls, a red golden hue takes to her skin, and a quarter moon on her forehead. Himalayas gifted her a fierce golden lion, and she is often seen riding upon this great beast. Along with her many arms she was also given very powerful weapons from each of the Gods and assumes mudras, or symbolic hand gestures.

On the end of the 8th and the beginning of the 9thday of the waxing moon, the demons, Chanda and Munda came to fight the Goddess. Her color turned to liquid blue with anger and the Goddess Chamunda lunged out of her third eye. She finally killed the demons with her sword.

What's Behind a Name
The name Durga in Sanskrit means
"invincible." The syllable "du" is synonymous with the 4 devils of poverty, suffering, famine, and evil habits. The "r" refers to disease, and the "ga" is the destroyer of sins, injustice, irreligion, cruelty, and laziness.

Spring is a great time of year to replace your magickal and or house hold broom. Broom lore has played an important role in many Pagan traditions. Follow the instructions below to construct your own magickal broom.

The Broom

The broom has been associated with magick sense the ancient earlier days. This common household tool is so scared in so parts of the world that there are actually broom deities.

In China, the broom Godess is Sao Ch'ing
Niang, known as the Lady with the Broom. She
lives on the Broom Star and presides over good
weather.

In the old days several different types of brooms were made for magickal purposes. Today most tend to have one for magickal workings and one for mundane practicle purposes.

Broom Magick

- When using a broom for the first time, make a wish and it will come true.
- Placing a small broom under a persons pillow was thought to keep evil from a persons slumber.
- Two brooms crossed and hung on the door or a wall is said to guard the house as is placing a broom on the ground before the main door.
- It is unlucky to buy a broom in the month of August.
- If you have nightmares, you can put a broom under the bed to sweep away the bad dreams.
- If a broom drops across a door way, you will soon go on a journey. However, be sure to pick it up quickly don't step over it.

How to Make a Magickal Broom

It is fairly easy to make your own magick broom.

You will need a fallen stick from your yard, straw (you can find this at your local craft store,) or fallen pine needles and some string (I prefer embroidery floss doubled.)

Take the straw or pine needles and bunch them into small bundles tying them securely with the floss. Do this until you have about 6 small bundles of straw or pine needles.

Now you are ready to attach them to your stick. Take the floss and wrap it around a bundle several times securing it with a knot and then wrap around the stick several times and securing it with a knot. Do this for all the bundles securing them as you go. When you reach your lst bundle allow enough floss to wrap several times around the stick to insure that the bundles will hold and secure with a knot.

Take good care of your new magickal broom.

Cauldron Cookies

3/4 softened butter 2 cups brown sugar 2 eggs

1 tablespoon of lemon juice 2 table spoons of grated lemon rind 2 cups flour

1 cup finely chopped pecans

Cream the butter in a large cast iron cauldron (or mixing bowl). Gradually add the brown sugar, beating well. Add the eggs lemon juice and rind, and then beat by hand or with an electric mixer until the mixture is well blended. The next step is to stir in the flour and pecans. Cover the cauldron with a lid, or foil and refrigerate overnight. When ready shape the dough into one inch balls and place about three inches apart on greased cookie sheets. Bake in a 375-degree preheated oven for approximately eight minutes. Remove from the oven and place on wire racks until completely cooled. This recipe yields about 36 cookies which can be served at any of the eight sabbats and well as the esbats and all other Witchy get togethers.

Inviting A Friend

As a child is usually not custom to actually invite a friend to join in a ritual without first discussing it with your parent or another adult. However, there may come a time that a good non-Pagan friend will attend a ritual or celebration with you. Usually this is not very common, however, in relationships where the families are friends it may happen. Although parents tend to work their own way, your friend will need you to comfort them where they don't feel so ackward or lost during things.

It is best to only give them a few do's and don'ts because too many will make them nervous and on edge during things which usually means accidents happen. In the long list of things you need to dwindle down to the most important and needed, in the end would probably only be two things. If your group casts a circle, be sure to tell them if they feel uncomfortable and a need to leave to ask someone next to them to help them leave the circle properly. It is also important that you tell them to not touch anything, especially things on altars or belonging to people within the group. The only thing left to do is to do what is natural and use their common sense.

During the ritual be sure to stay close to your friend to comfort them throughout. Talk before hand about how people will dress and/or what they will be like. If your group requires participants to say, eat, or do things during ritual be sure to tell them what it is in advance and when it is going on be sure to look at them with smile and such so they are comfortable doing it. Discuss the last ritual you went to and walk them through what happens and how it works. Make sure you prepare them for the before and after festivities as well as letting them know when the actual ritual begins and ends because they may not be familiar with the cues you know of. Tell them to take something small with them to keep in their pocket, like a small stone, to rub when they are feeling nervous or on edge.

You need to prepare yourself for this visit as well as watch yourself during it. Be sure to dress your best no matter what you are wearing. Make sure you, yourself, understand what is going to be happening so you will have no surprises; if you are even a little confused for a second your friend will notice, especially if they themselves are nervous already. Remember you are the example of yourself, the religion, and the group so be sure to act appropriately.

Be sure to share more than just the ritual or celebration with your friend. Have them come a little early for before activities and stay a little after for the activities that take place then as well. If they are feeling confortable introduce them to other people that have attended, be sure to include the one who was in charge of things as a courtesy to both parties.

It would be nice if you asked them what they thought and/or if they had any questions a few days after the event. Answer everything they ask or let them know you aren't sure and make a point of asking someone who does and getting back to them with the answer. It might also be a nice jester to ask them if you can attend the next meeting, ceremony, ritual, or other special religious event they have coming up. It is great to share and/or understand each other's religions among good friends.

Festival of Lupercus

Each single male would draw a piece of paper to find out who his girlfriend would be for the year. This celebration has stood the test of time although it has been adapted to different religions and times. The common accepted name for this holiday is Valentine's Day where most exchange valentines to let other's know how they feel about them.


