Wind Coloring

Color with the wind by following the steps below:


- 1. Tape a piece of paper outside on a flat place that is out in the open enough for the wind to hit it.
- 2. Secure crayons to the end of crayons by both tying them and using warm straight pins to go through it and hold the string that is tied. (An adult will have to help with this step)
- 3. Tie the crayons above the paper where the tips are barely sitting on the paper.
- 4. Allow time to go by for the wind to do it's coloring.
- 5. Add in some coloring of your own to make a nice picture.

Rain Painting

Paint with the rain by following the steps below:

- 1. Put large paint spots randomly on card stock.
- 2. When it is raining put the picture outside by laying it on the ground. Be careful that the wind is not blowing too much to carry it off; if it is then simply place rocks on the corners to secure it.
- 3. Allow the rain to paint for awhile.
- 4. Bring inside and lay on a flat surface and allow it to dry.





Energy Drawing with the Sun

Do some energy drawings with the sun by following the steps below:

- 1. Use a piece of construction paper to trace your hand on.
- 2. Cut out the hand or have an adult do it for you.
- 3. Hold your cut-out hand in your hand and give it all the energy you can.
- 4. Glue your hand on a piece of white printer paper.
- 5. Tape the picture on the outside of a window in a place that gets a lot of sun.
- 6. Allow it to sit for a couple of sunny days. Sometimes it takes a little less or more, just long enough for the white paper to turn brown.
- 7. Take it down and look at the energy that the sun gave the picture to add to the energy you gave it by the changing of color of the paper.

Mineral Focus

Hematite has several varieties, each with their own unique names.

- Hematite Rose is a circular arrangement of bladed crystals giving the appearance of the flower of a rose.
- *Tiger Iron* is a sedimentary deposit of approximately 2.2 billion years old that consists of alternating layers of silver gray hematite and red jasper, chert or even tiger eye quartz.
- *Kidney Ore* is the massive botryoidal form and gives the appearance of lumpy kidney-like masses.
- Oolitic Hematite is a sedimentary formation that has a reddish brown color and an earthy luster and is composed of small rounded grains.

Specularite is a micaceous or flaky stone that is sparkling silver gray and sometimes used as an ornamental stone.

Hematite is the principle ore of iron. Huge quantities are mined throughout the world for industrial production. It is the source for roughly 90 percent of all iron mined in the United States. Hematite was largely used in the past as a red and brown pigment, although nowadays cheaper sources have been substituted. Well formed Hematite crystals are popular among mineral collectors, and tumbled, highly lustrous Hematite from Brazil makes a very popular, inexpensive specimen for amateur collectors.

In 2001, Egyptian government archaeologist Zhai Hawass was the first to enter a previously undisturbed tomb, believed to be that of an ancient regional mayor, in the Bahariya Oasis below the town of Bawiti. Upon entering the burial chamber, Hawass discovered a booby trap consisting of 8 inches of finely powdered hematite dust covering the floor and sarcophagus. When disturbed by a tomb robber, the sharp, metallic dust was intended to become airborne and irritate the skin, eyes and mucous membranes, eventually causing lethal siderosis if exposed for long enough. The archaeological team was forced to retreat and don full body suits and respirators in order to confirm the identity of the mummy Hawass cites the ancient Egyptians' experience with powdered hematite as a paint pigment as proof that they were aware of its irritating properties.

Hematite helps one sort out things in ones own mind, and can be useful for a mental "tune up".

It helps memory enhancement, original thinking and technical knowledge.

Mineral Focus: Hemitite



Color: Hematite is rather variable in its appearance - it can be in reddish brown, ocherous masses, dark silvery-gray scaled masses, silvery-gray crystals, and dark-gray masses, to name a few. What they all have in common is a rust-red streak.

Chakra: solar plexus and heart **Healing Properties**: Hematite is a principal blood purifier among stone healers. It can be placed anywhere on the body for this purpose, or worn as a ring, pendant or necklace for continuous healing. It is also considered a grounding stone, which makes it useful for those people who have difficulty concentrating on the "here-and-now". Shamans historically have believed that Hematite, placed over the location of an illness, will draw the "spirit" of the illness out of the patient and into itself. Magickal Properties: Hematite has long been associated with psychic awareness. In addition, some people believe that it assists in astral travel and scrying.

Lustre: Metallic, Sub-Metallic, Dull, Earthy

Hematite derives its name from the Greek word *haem* (blood) in allusion to its red color.

The spectral signature of hematite was seen on the planet Mars by the infrared spectrometer on the NASA Mars Global Surveyor ("MGS") and 2001 Mars Odyssey spacecraft in orbit around Mars.

A Stone for Creativity? You Bet!

Did you ever need help focusing your creativity, especially on a given task? Did you really truly *want* to work on a creative project, but just couldn't figure out how to 'flesh it out'? Perhaps reaching for a particular gemstone will help imbue you with its energy, to help you get the correct focus.

Amazonite is typically a variety of green, from yellowish to a bluish-green. It is occasionally referred to as Amazon jade, probably due to its similarity in color, but not in texture. Unlike jade, Amazonite is not smooth when 'finished'. It would most likely be thought of as a green 'rock', as it is similar to in appearance to feldspar, if you weren't aware or sensitive to feeling energy fields of stones.

Physically, it's good for the heart, nerves and nervous system. Some even believe that it may be helpful to those with schizophrenia. Metaphysically, it is a calming, even soothing, stone. It helps balance the aura, as wells as aiding in the balancing of stress, nervousness, as well as a troubled mind.

Amazonite is just one of many stones associated with aiding creativity. Perhaps another would be of greater use, as it may also be more affordable. Remember, there is no one, right and only correct answer.

Herbal Focus

Collect nettle leaves before they flower in spring. They may be bad for the kidneys after they flower. New nettles come up in the fall, and you can pick them before they're killed by frost.

People have been using nettles for food, medicine, fiber, and dyes since the Bronze Age. Collect them using work gloves, and wear a long-sleeved shirt. If you happen upon nettles when you have no gloves, put your hand inside a bag. The young leaves are the best part of the plant. They come off most easily if you strip them counter-intuitively, from the top down.

Many of the benefits are due to the plant's very high levels of minerals, especially, calcium, magnesium, iron, potassium, phosphorous, manganese, silica, iodine, silicon, sodium, and sulfur. They also provide chlorophyll and tannin, and they're a good source of vitamin C, beta-carotene, and B complex vitamins. Nettles also have high levels of easily absorbable amino acids. They're ten percent protein, more than any other vegetable.

In the first century, Greek physicians Dioscorides and Galen reported the leaf of nettle had diuretic and laxative properties and was useful for asthma, pleurisy and spleen illnesses. Bandages soaked in a leaf and stem infusion were used in early American medicine to stop the bleeding of wounds; an account of this use was recorded by Dr. Francis P. Procher, a surgeon and physician in the Southern Confederacy during the Civil War. Nettle leaves were also recommended as a nutritious food and as a weight loss aid by the famous American plant forager and naturalist, Euell Gibbons.

Herb Focus: **Nettle**



Parts Used: The leaves and root Location: Found in rich soil, disturbed habitats, moist woodlands, thickets, along rivers, and along partially shaded trails.

Healing Properties: Hay fever**, asthma, mucus conditions of the lungs, chronic cough, flu, colds,

Magickal Attributes: Nettle works well in love, money, luck or health spells. Nettle also guards against danger and promotes courage.

Latin Name: Urtica dioica

Clean and chop nettles wearing rubber gloves. Once you've cooked them a little, the stingers (which are actually the small hairs on the leaves, as well as a naturally occurring oil on/in the leaves) are deactivated, and the plant becomes wonderfully edible.

The stinging sensation of the leaf hairs is caused by several plant chemicals including formic acid, histamine, serotonin, and choline.

The main use of the herbal remedies made from the nettle is in the role of a cleansing and detoxifying agent in the body. The diuretic action of the nettle is also a highly regarded property possessed by the herb; this property is probably due to the high content of bio-molecules known as the flavonoids and may also be because of the high potassium levels in the herb. The main property of the herbal remedy in this role is that it increases the total production of urine and helps in the effective elimination of accumulated metabolic waste products in the body, thus cleansing the liver.
