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Making the Connection

Making the Connection – Rites of Passage

Religion, at best, can be daunting. If you are a young child or teen, the task of making a connection between yourself and where you fit in to your religion, no matter the path, can be a difficult one. Don't allow this to discourage you, as we have all, at some point in our lives, felt this same way. Allow yourself to listen to the whispers deep within you, as they will bring you to the path you were meant to walk. When you open your mind and spirit to let these whispers in, you may even find that they have been leading you down your path all along. Being Pagan, we realize that we are connected to everyone and everything around us. Finding that connection is easier than you think.

There are moments in life, milestones, which are important and meant to be celebrated. These moments, wont typically happen again for you in this lifetime. While some may repeat themselves, there will only ever be one first. So, what's so important about these rites of passage? Why do your parents make a big deal over them? Well, let's go through some of them one by one and really look at them to find that connection in our spiritual life. Remember that while some of these will follow a specific order, not all of them follow that way.

The first Rite of Passage is known by a few names depending upon your path. You may have heard it called a Naming Ceremony, Wiccaning, or even a Paganing. It is in this instance where a child, many times as an infant, is presented to the Gods & Goddesses, as well as their Pagan community. What may happen is a request of the Gods and Goddesses to protect the child and guide them until they are old enough to choose the path they will follow. Those at the ceremony may present the child with a gift or a bead stating what it represents. For example, at one of my sons Wiccaning, he was given a copy of the book <u>Sons of the Goddess</u> so that he may always find his way. Some of these rites will have a child's magickal name chosen, as this is how the child will be known in their gatherings. There may even be a God Father and Goddess Mother named to help guide and raise the child up magickally. This rite is an important first one as it is typically the one that introduces them to their Pagan community. As traditions differ, the way this is celebrated may vary, but this is the first rite of passage in a Pagan community's life.

The next large step, or Rite of Passage, is the Coming of Age. Again, this will vary by tradition, but is typically celebrated at the time of puberty; when a girl has her first menses and when a boy's voice starts to change. This is close to the age of 13. In general, this celebration marks your entrance into adulthood. While you are not considered an adult until the age of 18, at least in the United States, once you reach puberty then you have reached a sexual maturity and that is what is really being celebrated. Your tradition may have you celebrate this level of maturation with people your age and older of the same sex. There may be a large event with all kinds of people from your Pagan community. In any instance, this is an important next step.

A third Rite of Passage would be the Rite of Initiation. This is definitely one that happens AFTER your Coming of Age. Whether you are self-initiated or Initiated within a group on your particular path, it makes no difference. It is an important step to take. When you were young, your parents, or community, asked that the Gods and God-desses watch over you and protect you until such a time that you could choose for yourself the path you wish to follow. This is THAT time. You have chosen to follow a specific path and are now old enough to be able to choose for yourself.

Following along in the Rites of Passage is a Handfasting. A Handfasting is the joining of two people in a union of love and trust. Now, whether that union is a temporary or permanent one is left to the couple. You are Handfasted and saying that you will be with this person for as long as the love lasts. Some people may handfast for a year and a day, to see if this is really the union that they want. From there they may look to make it a legal ceremony. For others, this IS their legal ceremony. They do not need a period of time to pass before they decide if this is the relationship for them.

Now with a Handfasting, I think it is worth mentioning that there is such a thing as a Handparting. As the name suggests, it is when you decide that this is not the union you want and therefore part ways. Obviously if this is a legally recognized union, there is going to be a filing for divorce involved. However, whether a legal union or not, the Rite of Handparting is a good way to spiritually recognize the separation of a union of a couple. Not all traditions have Handpartings, but I do feel that it is worth mentioning, as this rite could be as important as the Handfasting.

Some people feel called to become a Priestess or Priest, so they would then go through the Rite of Priestess or Priesthood. This will be individual to the person, group, coven, lodge, etc. Sometimes this Rite is specific to the Path, but it may or may not include the ability to legally marry or perform other legal unions and Rites. At other times the rites that may be performed by the Priest or Priestess are limited to any not requiring legal documentation. In any instance, the act of being able to legally perform certain rites or ceremonies does NOT make the position of the Priest or Priestess any better than a Priest or Priestess that is not recognized at able to perform such rites or ceremonies. We are all equal and the same respect should be shown to both types of Priests and Priest-esses. Becoming a clergy member is a very important step and one that is never undertaken lightly.

In addition is the Rite of Elderhood, Croning or Magehood. Those receiving this rite are the Elders of the community. This doesn't necessarily have to mean that they are older. It can denote a person's esteemed position of respected knowledge as well. However, you will find that older persons do go through the Elderhood Rite. They have reached a point in their life where they are older and more seasoned. These are the ones we look to like grandparents. Elders should be respected and honoring this next phase in their life is a wonderful thing. Too often our society looks to shuffle those who have reached this point in life out of the eye of mainstream society, but they are knowledgeable and typically well versed in many aspects of life.

The last rite I am going to touch upon is the Rite of Final Passage or the Summerlands Rite. As with the others, the name suggests the type of rite. Your spiritual self has shed the body for this life and is moving on to the next. So, with this we are celebrating the life you had here as well as helping move you forward on to the Summerlands or to whatever name your path may call this. While a sad occasion when someone dies, it can be a joyous and heartfelt one too. Remember that death is just another step in life.

While there may be other rites that are followed within a person's path, these are just a few that I wanted to touch upon. Life should be celebrated and the many changing moments highlighted. However, don't feel that you need only celebrate these rites and not other momentous occasions. Another Rite of Passage would be the day you get your driver's license. By all means, celebrate it! This is a grand undertaking and such an exciting thing. Small passages and big ones can all be celebrated. Birthdays are a rite of passage and the act of blowing out the candles is magickal itself. Enjoy life. The most important thing you can do is to make sure that you do take time to recognize these occasions and celebrate. As stated, these aren't all the rites of passages, but a few and I am sure in your lifetime there will be some that you create as well.

Mystical Baby


Needed:

Stuff the tip of the sock




Use rubber bands to make

Naming / Paganing

After making your own Mystical Doll hold a Naming, Paganing, or Wiccaning ceremony, whichever your path calls it. Be sure to include some traditional favorites as well as things you feel important. Allow your parent/mentor to be a part of the planning but you can do the ceremony alongside them. Below are some idea's to include in your ceremony or celebration.

Naming

This is the time for you to pick a name for your mystical baby. Think of a nice name together with your Pagan adult. Allow them to show you a few ways Pagan names are chosen. This is also a great time to find out how your name was chosen, or theirs if you don't have a Pagan name yet.

Trinket Gift

Find small trinkets that you have or make some out of paper and tie them to a string. Make sure to make knots for each item that you place on the string. Hang this in your room or where ever your mystical baby lives. This is a traditional gift for the occasion.

Altar Set-Up

Set up a small area or altar in honor of the celebration. You can include traditional items like incense, items for the elements, special gifts for the mystical baby, or anything you and your adult Pagan decide. Leave it up for awhile after the ceremony and near the celebration so the energy flows for awhile.

Plants

In most Paganings / Wiccanings, trees are planted in honor of the baby. Since you are doing yours for the Mystical Baby you can use any type of plant you want. Put it in your room and take care of it as its energy will help take care of your mystical Baby.



Herbal Focus

The well-known Mistletoe is an evergreen parasitic plant, growing on the branches of trees, where it forms pendent bushes, 2 to 5 feet in diameter. It will grow and has been found on almost any deciduous tree, preferring those with soft bark, and being, perhaps, commonest on old Apple trees, though it is frequently found on the Ash, Hawthorn, Lime and other trees. On the Oak, it grows very seldom. It has been found on the Cedar of Lebanon and on the Larch, but very rarely on the Pear tree.

When one of the familiar sticky berries of the Mistletoe comes into contact with the bark of a tree - generally through the agency of birds - after a few days it sends forth a thread-like root, flattened at the extremity like the proboscis of a fly. This finally pierces the bark and roots itself firmly in the growing wood, from which it has the power of selecting and appropriating to its own use, such juices as are fitted for its sustenance: the wood of Mistletoe has been found to contain twice as much potash, and five times as much phosphoric acid as the wood of the foster tree. Mistletoe is a true parasite, for at no period does it derive nourishment from the soil, or from decayed bark, like some of the fungi do - all its nourishment is obtained from its *host*. The root becomes woody and thick.

---History---Mistletoe was held in great reverence by the Druids. They went forth clad in white robes to search for the sacred plant, and when it was discovered, one of the Druids ascended the tree and gathered it with great ceremony, separating it from the Oak with a golden knife. The Mistletoe was always cut at a particular age of the moon, at the beginning of the year, and it was only sought for when the Druids declared they had visions directing them to seek it. When a great length of time elapsed without this happening, or if the Mistletoe chanced to fall to the ground, it was considered as an omen that some misfortune would befall the nation. The Druids held that the Mistletoe protected its possessor from all evil, and that the oaks on which it was seen growing were to be respected because of the wonderful cures which the priests were able to effect with it. They sent round their attendant youth with branches of the Mistletoe to announce the entrance of the New Year. It is probable that the custom of including it in the decoration of our homes at Christmas, giving it a special place of honour, is a survival of this old custom.

The curious basket of garland with which 'Jack-in-the-Green' is even now occasionally invested on May-day is said to be a relic of a similar garb assumed by the Druids for the ceremony of the Mistletoe. When they had found it they danced round the oak to the tune of 'Hey Derry down, down, down Derry!' which literally signified, '*In a circle move we* round the oak. 'Some oak woods in Herefordshire are still called '*the Derry*'; and the following line from Ovid refers to the Druids' songs beneath the oak:

'---Ad viscum Druidce cantare solebant---.'

Shakespeare calls it 'the baleful Mistletoe,' an allusion to the Scandinavian legend that Balder, the god of Peace, was slain with an arrow made of Mistletoe. He was restored to life at the request of the other gods and goddesses, and Mistletoe was afterwards given into the keeping of the goddess of Love, and it was ordained that everyone who passed under it should receive a kiss, to show that the branch had become an emblem of love, and not of hate. Herb Focus: Mistletoe

Parts Used: The leaves and young twigs, berries

Location: Common used plants are found in the Americas and Europe. Healing Properties: Nervine, antispasmodic, tonic and narcotic. Has a great reputation for curing the 'falling sickness' epilepsy - and other convulsive nervous disorders. It has also been employed in checking internal hemorrhage. Other unverified uses included treatment of internal bleeding, convulsions, infertility, arthritis, rheumatism, gout, hysteria, whooping cough, asthma, hypertension, headache, dizziness, menstrual cycle and menopausal symptoms, diarrhea, chorea (rapid, jerky movements), and rapid heartbeat Magickal Attributes: Celts and Germans believed that Mistletoe is a key to the supernatural.

Latin Name: Viscum album


- Mistletoe is especially interesting botanically because it is a partial parasite (a "hemiparasite"). As a parasitic plant, it grows on the branches or trunk of a tree and actually sends out roots that penetrate into the tree and take up nutrients. But mistletoe is also capable for growing on its own; like other plants it can produce its own food by photosynthesis.
- Mistletoe has held interest as a possible anticancer agent since the 1920's. This is because extracts derived from it have been shown to kill cancer cells and to stimulate

The Pagan Wheel of Life

Life goes in special stages that can be considered spokes of a wheel. The easiest one for you to relate to would be the education. The education wheel has spokes for each level of schooling you must go through. It would have spokes for pre-school, elementary school, junior high school, high school, and college. Each spoke would be labeled to form the wheel.

- Celebrate your new role when a new member of the family arrives.

Life's Web of Passage


Begin a web of life craft to hang in your room. On each rite of passage or stage of life you come to add something to the 'web' portion. This can be a great memory trophy for you to always have near.

To make the web:

Find two twigs that are pretty flimsy and at least an adult arm's length long. Use string to tie them together in any shape you like; a tear drop, circle, oval, or anything that feels right to you. Once done use thin cord, string, or yarn to weave a web inside of the shape you made. Use any pattern or colors that you feel good using.

Additions:

When you add things to your web of passage craft be sure they will not mess up your original design. You may always want to weave the item into the web instead of tie it on for certain stages of life that stand for freedom. Have your items represent either the rite of passage, how you felt during it, or just something that caught your eye while it was taking place.

• The name comes from the Greek word onyx which means nail of a finger or claw. Legend says that one day while Venus was sleeping Eros/Cupid cut her fingernails and left the clippings scattered on the ground. Because no part of a heavenly body can die, the gods turned them into stone which later became known as onyx.

• Thought to increase regeneration, happiness, intuition, instincts, helps to change bad habits.

• Retains physical body strength. Receives and holds vibrations both good and bad. Protects from negativity.

• Onyx is the Mystical birthstone for the month of December. It is also the birth stone for the Zodiac sign of Leo. Onyx is also given on the 7th and 10th wedding anniversary.

• True onyx is simply a black and white banded variety of quartz allied to agate. These bands being straight and parallel, onyx is sometimes known as "zebra agate" or, if the stone is completely black, "black agate". During the 1950s it was very popular as a stone for men's signet rings. It is now used for intaglios and cameos, necklaces and small pieces of jewelry.

• Onyx is a strength giving stone. It provides support in difficult circumstances and brings personal strength and self-confidence. It promotes vigor and stamina. It is a secretive stone that helps you to keep your own counsel. Onyx is a very grounding stone. It is useful for past life work because of its ability to hold memories. It heals old grief. Onyx balances the yin and yang of the body. It is beneficial for teeth, bones, blood disorders and the feet.

Onyx is great for defense against negativity. Onyx is an extremely potent protective stone, and is widely known for its ability to protect against psychic attacks.

Associations:

- Associated Crystals: Jet and sardonyx.
- Candle Color: White.
- Chakra: Root.
- Element: Earth.
- Flowers & Plants: Blackthorn blossom, edelweiss and flowering ivy.

• Herbs - Incenses - Oils: Aloe vera, ambergris, cypress and patchouli.

• Planet: Saturn. Zodiac: Capricorn. Enjoy the bookmark below.

Mineral Focus: Onyx

Color: Black or brown sometimes with white bands Chakra: Root

Healing Properties: It promotes vigor and stamina, beneficial for teeth, bones, blood disorders and the feet

Magickal Properties: Black Onyx is excellent for grounding negativity and releasing stress. Black Onyx can be worn for protection, to banish grief, and to encourage happiness and good fortune. It encourages happiness, good fortune and morality Lustre: Vitreous

Due to the enormously high demand, natural occurrences not cover it all; as a result, the majority of the Onyx available in the trade available Onyx is man-made.

Black Onyx is often used as a backdrop in jewelry, such as cameos. It is also used as cabochons and as a building material.

Black and colored onyx is always dyed. Onyz is easily dyed, so beware of the more "unnatural" looking colors, such as bright blue, etc. Onyx with red and white bands is sometimes referred to as "Sardonyx". Onyx is the black variety of agate. However some parts are more or less translucent. This is why it is often heated to accentuate the intensity of its color.

This will be one of the important steps of Paganism that you will have.

Be sure to talk to your elder Pagans about the ceremony and it's meaning. Ask about what will take place and what is expected of you during the festivities. Find out who can come and see if you can invite your friends if you would like to, sometimes it is possible.

Most importantly find out what is expected of you once you have passed over the ritual, ceremony, or celebration. Be sure to try your best to achieve what you need to, act the way you are expected to, and take them as an honor not an obligation. Enjoy your new position and be sure to make the most of it!

Special Time

Most coming of age passages begin celebration with some separation of the one passing from society. This could mean spending time in your room without any electronics for a week-end to spending a week alone at a quiet resort without having any interaction with the people there.

This time is granted so that you will have time to remember the past and prepare for the future. You will let go of your childhood, for the most part, and begin entering the adult world. Be sure to use your time wisely because you will never be able to go to this time again.

How will you have your special time? Be sure to ask your Pagan adult about this and any other questions you have concerning it. It is best to be prepared for everything that is coming your way; especially the important steps that it contains.

Markings

There are many who reach the coming of age and it is tradition to mark it in some way. The marking is used to mark the great event of the child crossing over to the grown-up world. The most common markings of today are tattoos, piercings, and the wearing of a certain kind of jewelry, or a new hobby. What kind of marking did or will you take on?

College Connections

Don't feel that you will not be able to continue your Paganism once you left home and head out to college. Each college has a Pagan community in the form of a group. There are usually special meetings, rituals, as well as community based activities all within the Pagan group. For some teens this is the first Pagan group that they are in with their peers instead of all adults which makes it very fun and exciting at the same time.

There is also a newly forming group called The National League of Pagan Students. At the Table Discussions

Share a story of when you or someone you know celebrated a rite of passage. Tell funny stories and small details as casual conversations. Ask your children which rites they would like to have and some of the things they want at them. Let them know if there are any coming up, especially if they are for them. They will love you sharing this knowledge with them.

Showing food stages

In your meal include some things that show food at different stages. It will help with the discussion of rites of passage. When food has a rite of passage it is simply prepared which in itself is a celebration of sorts honoring the stage it is in. When we bless our food with the God and Goddess we are also showing our thanks to the food that made it to our table.

Some ideas for food to do this with are:

- Peppers (they change colors as they grow and with each color is a different flavor; hot, mild, bland)
- Tomatoes (they are good as fried green tomatoes and as they age into the familiar red)
- Grapes (they are good when they are in their prime as well as when they are almost dead as raisins)
- Fish (we eat them as eggs, caviar and as they age in fish dishes)
- Chickens (are eaten before they are born in the form of an egg and then as they grow in chicken dishes)

Moving Around

Now that the worst part of winter is over it is a great time to consider having your mystical evening somewhere other than the house. You may need to add a few more candles, move things around, or simply lay out a few more blankets in places that you never thought you could hold this great dinner at. I have held them in sheds, garages, behind a grove of trees, and in the car before.

When thinking of new places to explore it is wise to also think of the symbolic or connection to the topic of the month, sometimes it will turn out that this was the reason we chose it anyway. Hello Parents! Well another month has passed. My how the year is flying! As time passes on our children seem to grow in leaps and bounds. Celebrating their changes is a wonderful way to recognize and honor their growth. With younger children, they always want to grow up so fast. Simple rites of passage, even of the smallest kind, will help them feel like they are really growing without the need to jump from diapers to high heels.

Recognize and celebrate the small achievements and milestones as well as the large. For smaller milestones, keep it simple. You don't want them to seem unimportant, but, at the same time, you don't want to over do things. A special cupcake with a candle in it and maybe a chant that encompasses what you're celebrating with your child is a simple, yet special way to celebrate these smaller milestones.

For larger rites of passage, plan ahead and really make a day of it. Try to figure out what you'll need or what your child may need. Celebrating a rite of passage is great, but if the one's whose rite it is doesn't feel comfortable with it then it may not go so well. Depending upon the type of rite, talk to your child and get their input. What would they want or how would they plan if it were up to them? Now this won't be true in all instances. You can't always get a child's input, but there are times that it may work out. A coming of age rite would be a good one to get input on, but a child is obviously too young to have any say in a Naming or Blessing ceremony.

Rites of Passage are exciting times. There are so many changes in life and things we take for granted. We sometimes get so caught up in life that those moments, small and large seem to slip by. To a 30 year old, celebrating another birthday may not be exciting, but to a 4 year old about to turn 5, the whole world is about to open up to them in their eyes because they are a WHOLE YEAR older! These are the things we should celebrate and not let pass as just another thing that happens. Point out the magick and wonder in any rites you may attend. While a Summerlands Rite may not be a momentous occasion of great joy, there is still magick there. Make sure you remain open enough to be able to pint these instances out to your children.

While we all may celebrate rites of passage in different manners, what we all have in common is that we celebrate the importance of these moments. These are once in a lifetime happenings. How many times will your youngest child turn 1? How many times will we go through a Croning? I'm pretty sure the answer is once. So, make the moments memorable and celebrate them and the magick that surrounds us. Make sure your children understand the importance and answer all questions as they arise. Last, but not least, while as grown-ups we may not WANT to get older, enjoy the changes as they come.

Special Pagans By: Raven

Sharing your Pagan faith with your children can sometimes prove a difficult task, especially if one of those children has special needs. First and foremost, remember that you are the best parent and teacher for your child. As the mother of a special needs child I often have to re-think the way I am conveying a message. Each month we will cover a different topic, and while I will give suggestions for ways to convey meanings, in the end, it is you, the parent, who knows which ways work best for your child.

Celebrating rites of passage for your special pagan is, in my opinion, very important. It is as important to celebrate their small accomplishments as well as their larger ones. To the rest of the world, simple tasks to us like tying our shoes or moving up to the next reading level isn't anything difficult, but to our special pagans these could be very huge steps. Now, I'm not saying that this is the case for all of our special pagans, but I am just trying to point out that even some of the simplest accomplishments should be recognized and not just glossed over. For our wonderful children, who give us the ability to look at the world differently, those small tasks may have taken them some time to complete, so why not celebrate?

So how do we celebrate the smaller accomplishments? Maybe a dinner of their favorite foods is the way to go. You may want to take them for a special outfit, or out for ice cream. Maybe even a special piece of jewelry or a crystal would be appropriate. Whatever you decide for these smaller rites, keep it simple. Make sure that it is different from the everyday usual, but not so different, or big, that it makes the larger rites not seem to carry a great importance. Also, be sure to explain why you are giving them something or doing something special.

When it comes time to plan for a larger Rite of Passage, such as Coming of Age ceremony or a Handfasting, be sure to include your special pagan. Any rites meant for them should always have their best interest and their abilities in mind. If you know they don't do well in situations where there are lots of people, don't plan a rite where the attendees are many. All nuances, even the smallest one, should be taken into consideration. The same applies if you will be attending a rite of passage for someone else with your special pagan. Giving them the information they need or the basic layout of how the rite will be performed will help them understand. Try to walk them through the basic steps of the rite. Make sure to let your special pagan know who the rite is for, why it is happening, what is being celebrated, etc. In my own experience, I have found it is better to really explain things to my special pagan and give her "advance warning" as I like to call it. When she knows the whats and whys of things, she is so much better equipped to handle the situation. It also makes things go smoother. Another way to prepare your special pagan is through pictures. If there is anyone, including you, who has gone through this rite before, pull out the photo albums where the pictures are and show him or her what they may see or experience. It's just another way of helping them understand what will be happening around them.

Whatever the rite, or celebration, enjoy the moment. Try to see things from your special pagan's viewpoint. Help them to make the magickal connection with the day and the celebration. As many questions as they may have, answer those and then ask them how the celebration makes them feel. Find out from your special pagan what they were thinking as the rite was going on. At the end of the day, you want your special pagan to be happy and comfortable, so do what you feel is needed to make sure that happens. However you celebrate for your special pagan, I am sure it will be the most perfect rite for them.

What Should the Kids Know?

It is difficult sometimes to decide whether or not to include your children in all things Pagan. The subject is so touchy that many families steer clear from it for the most part.

Involving your children does not mean that they should attend things with you all the time, sometimes just knowing what is going on is enough. Taking a child to a Pagan gatherings without them knowing what is going to happen there may be a mistake.

I remember once taking my daughter to her first Pagan Pride Day event at the age of 7. While watching the belly dancers she blurted rather loudly, "I'm tired of watching that old woman dancing." As a parent and a fairly known person in my local Pagan chapter I was totally embarrassed. I then pulled my daughter aside and explained about why the woman was dancing and how she needed to act as part of the audience. It is times like this that you question yourself as to why you didn't prepare your child in advance.

You can simply tell your child what you did while you were gone, and get specific so they actually know. You don't have to include anything you feel not age appropriate, but the basics should be covered. Telling them you went to a ritual, what it celebrated, and a few things you saw while you were there is usually enough information for most kids. Of course, the older ones could know more.

Whenever you feel it is time to include them in Pagan gatherings then do so. Some feel from day one while other's feel a certain level of maturity should be there first. When you do it is entirely up to you and your beliefs, just be sure to prepare your child first; this should not be a sink and swim experience.

All Pagans have rites of passage ceremonies and times, each path however has different names and times they are celebrated. You should educate your child on the rites of passage; it is one of the Pagan things that they can look forward to. Share when you or those you know celebrate and allow them to watch or be educated on the subject.

Beginner Magick Series

For the next few months we are going to take a peek at how different paths do magick. You will find a small amount of magick from a certain path for you to learn a little more about it. Don't feel that you have to do these; you can use them for education purposes only. This month: *Hoodoo*

Charms

Charms are common gifts for most of the rites of passage for Pagans. Let's do a little exploring into them and how to bless them.

Charms are small drawstring bags (2" wide, 3" long) that are worn inside of clothing. The charm will have power of its own and will act as a simple spell to aid in the matter it was made for.

Choosing what to put in your charm is up to you, just be sure it is an uneven number and it contains at least one thing belonging to the individual for whom it is made. Be sure to do your homework on each and every item that is included and that its correspondence is appropriate for the reason it is made as well as how it will react with the other items you have chosen. Some usual items to think about are listed below.

Personal items (finger nails, hair, discarded tissue, etc)										
Roots	Stones	Herbs	Flowers							
	Powders	Bones								

Material or feathers of different colors (to represent that color) Small items (coins, dice, small trinkets)

Comprise your charm in ritual where you bless each item as it goes into the bag. Close the bag (it is best to hand sew it) tight before the end of the ritual. After the bag is closed be sure to include a simple chant that will aid the mixture of the items to their purpose as you picture it happening in your mind. Be sure to bless the charm with a splash of oil or water before ending your ritual.

When presenting the charm to the intended person be sure to let them know what it is for and not the contents that it contains because every person may see the contents in a different way. When you comprised your charm your intent and view on the items that made it up is what the charm will represent. If you used an important oil when doing the ritual to seal the bag you may want to give the recipient a small bottle of it as well so they can re-oil it once a week for a month or so while they wear it. It is also nice to include a safety pin so they may pin it on
