Time Walk of the Pagans

You can find Pagan history in almost all parts of the world. It goes back as far as we consider 'ancient history'. In its birth, Paganism was the only type of religion known. Each area had their own way of showing respect to the God/Goddess, and a set of holidays that were important. Each had a pantheon that they worshipped.

Although the basics are the same, the religions of the ancient ones were very different. The names and purposes of the Gods and Goddess were different (some just a little). Ways to show respect and hold rituals were not the same. Celebrations were separated by high (very important) and low (important). Things were the same for all Pagans, however, there was enough of a difference in each due to the culture and/or geological area.

Overall, the beginning shows the world being raised by nature and the people that were permitted to live there, showing respect and honoring it. This way was the only way for a long time. Then, there came monotheism (the belief in only one god). This turned the Pagan world upside down. It was during this time that the world seemed to have separated and some aspects of each religion merged together to weave a new religious world.

The Pagans had a lot of things happening in their own world and some of the changes weren't even noticed. Sacred Gods and Goddesses were demoted and carried into some Monotheistic religions. Land and very special items were destroyed and can never again be seen. In the end, the changes were devastating to Paganism as it had been known of.

From this time up until today, Paganism is having a hard time staying alive. It has gone from the only way to being the minority. Throughout time, Pagans have been hurt and ridiculed for their beliefs. Being Pagan is more than just a religion, it is a choice to do as you feel right and stand up for it.

Be proud of who you are, be just as proud of your religion. A good way to do this is to come up with a symbol that represents you. This has been done throughout history in many cultures and times. You are probably familiar with the coat of arms that represented your lineage or the great designs that come from the Native Americans showing who they are. Here is an example of how this can be done. You may want to take the time to make one of your own once you understand how they are made. Remember too, that your symbol may change as you change.

Proteus is sometimes referred to as the 'old man of the sea'..so a cane to represent him

To be free means to fly (wings) but tied to the ground to show tied down.

Night = moon

After a lot of arranging and drawing. he came up with a symbol to represent him by using the items that represented the things that were about him

The symbol is so easy he can doodle it whenever he wants. Each time he remembers all the parts him that make it up.

Hiding vs. Respect

Keeping your religion secret from those that may not approve and/or don't practice it has some controversy. Hopefully this article will allow you to understand more what exactly the argument is and help you find your own view on the subject.

Hiding it view:

Respecting view:

View Origins

The majority view on things is usually taken from several places. There are the few that come to conclusions on their own, however, in today's world that seems to not be the norm.

Think about your view of certain things: other religions, types of people, other cultures, etc. Look at the list of usual places that influences of views are taken from, and decide which ones contribute to the view you have of the things listed earlier. If the opinion you came to was not actually totally from you, take the time to research and learn so you can come to your own decision. This would be a great practice for you to use throughout life.

Peers (friends or neighbors)
Adults (parents, teachers, or other trusted adults)
Media (television, radio, movies, newspaper, etc...)
Stories (from books to stories that are told by others)
The Past (From people, historians, books, etc...)

Try to look at what kind of influences these things have had on your religion and the religion of other's you know.

Make a special point not to make a judgment on any subject when using possible untrue facts or resources.

Carrying Paths

Tina rushed to finish up her nails before karate class. She used white to paint them because it matched her karate suit. Her friends notice that each time she wears something she paints only half of each nail a color that matches her clothes. They feel it is just her style. Tina knows that she does this because she feels she lives half a life when she is out and about and the half painted nail reminds her of her other half; her strong Pagan beliefs.

Sean has collected small figurines that actually make up a Celtic clan. He keeps them on his altar by his bedroom door. Each time he leaves his room he takes one with him, usually the one that has a face representing how he feels. He will place it back in it's exact spot when he comes home. Sean does this ritual because he is Pagan following a Celtic path. His parents does not believe in the Pagan faith and look down on it so Sean uses his room as a sanctuary and when he takes a figurine with him as he leaves he is carrying the comfort of his Paganism with him.

Roy's family is totally Pagan, however, they each follow their own path. Roy, at the moment, is walking with the Norse path and feels a connection with Thor. Roy has a necklace with a hammer on it that he wears everywhere. Only his family know that he is actually carrying a talisman dedicated to Thor with him, his friends think he just likes knifes.

Lawna is a homeschooled Pagan. She is a member of many homeschooled groups; Spiral Scouts, CUUPS, and even a local Pagan homeschool co-op. She wears her pentacle most all places she goes because it makes her feel the God and Goddess is with her. Her grandmother does not believe in the Pagan way, so out of respect for her grandmother she tucks it in her shirt when she visits her. She keeps it in her shirt when she is hanging out at the arcade too, because a lot of kids in her area do not understand her belief.

Feel your area and each situation you come across. If you feel the need to have something always close to you connected to your faith be sure to do so. You should always pick something that is acceptable to the area but that doesn't hide or deny your own path.

Ancient Thoughts From Greece

Akakios of Miletus prepared himself to join in on the festivals held during what is now the end of October and beginning of Nov. There were a total of three ceremonies, two on the first day and then another one on the last day. Akakios of Miletus and his family would participate and celebrate all of them. This was the first year he would be able to be a part of the celebrations, and he was very excited.

The first celebration was Puanepsia, in celebration of the God and Goddess connected to the sun, where he would join all the children that had both a mother and father still living. They would go through town carrying laurel wands with lyre shaped pastries on them, cups, and vines branches. They would go from door to door to collect gifts for those that would offer them in return for Eiresione. They will hang the Eiresione above their door because it will bring them good luck all year long.

His mother had been working with the town women as they took time to stir the cauldron which contained beans, vegetables and cereals. The thick soup was warm in the tummy and very filling. The contents of the cauldron would be almost gone by the time it fed all the people of the town as they celebrated Puanepsia.

Later that evening another celebration, Ôskophoria, to balance summer, would take place. It would be in honor of Dionysus, and his mother would have her chance to take the same walk he did through the town. She would follow behind two men dressed as women in long tunics carrying grape branches and the herald, who will have a garland-wrapped wand branch. His mother's position in the parade-type walk will be called the Dinner Carrier. She will walk it with several other chosen women to carry the sacred meal of meat, bread, and will tell many magical stories of the past. He thought of how he loved to hear the stories told by his mother and the other women. They seemed to keep everyone starry-eved and waiting for the next words to come out of their mouths.

He knew it would be a late night now and an early morning tomorrow. Tomorrow held another great celebration in honor of Theseus, known as Theseia. The whole day was filled with processions, sacrifices, and athletic contests. Some his father would participate in, others his friends would. The day would also include the sacred meal that his mother will carry today. He liked the porridge made of husked wheat and milk, but loved the meat with special seasonings on it.

Akakios of Miletus was interrupted in his thoughts because it was time for him to prepare for the great walk through town. He jumped up to gather his wand and other items he had to carry. A smile came across his face and his heart raced.

The High Day Walk

The high day of Samhain has been celebrated in a lot of different cultures and during different times throughout history. Although done very differently, all Samhain celebrations hold certain things in common; spiritual meaning, sacred ceremonies or rituals, connections with the underworld etc... Many cultures, like the ancient Greeks, did not call this time of year Samhain, but the celebrations were similar to what is expected for the high day.

Today's Samhain celebration is not that much different than that of our ancestors. Many of the traditions that society carries actually derived from Pagans of the past. Each religion has its own views on what should happen for this holiday, as well as different reasons and stories of the past. The high day of today is actually a collaboration of all things from the past and the traditions of many different cultures.

Since you exist in the times of today, you will be the one to pass your views and procedure to celebrate Samhain to future earth residences. Do some research to learn in depth how the ancestors of your religious and family's past celebrated this high day. Add some of the things you find with your own ideas to find your own personal way to spend and celebrate this high day.

The future of this high day will contain all that has past as well as the things of today. They will add your ways, traditions, and views of the high day and intertwine them to make a unique and exciting celebration. Be sure to set trends that have your heart and your religion in mind and not to just copy what others are doing.

Money Saving Costume Tips

On the very first day of October, I ask my children what ideas they have for their Halloween costumes. Throughout the day we discuss the materials we will need, and what resources we can use from our home before going to the thrift shop.

There are many things in your home that can be used to create your costume. Cereal boxes make great masks, and you can decorate them with dried beans to give them an interesting texture. Old clothes with holes or stains can easily be turned into the torn up clothes you might see on a zombie. Sheets make great ghost costumes, and towels turn into capes very easily.

After Halloween is over, we put our costumes into a large storage container so we can use them again during playtime. The container is also great to store items that can be used next Halloween. In November, many thrift stores (and larger mega-stores) put the costumes on clearance. Find items that are just a bit larger so they will fit throughout the year.

If you really want a specific costume, but cannot find the items you need around your home, consider bartering with a local seamstress or tailor. Many times I will start the sewing project, then ask someone with advanced skills to help me finish it. In return, I offer to provide a meal, watch their children, or help clean up their home.

Remember, imagination is the first thing you will need to create a costume. Once you have the idea, a quick search online will help you finish it to completion.

Wee Pagans

Happy Samhain! This is one of my favorite times of the year. I love Samhain/Halloween decorations. I thought I would share with you some of the crafts I made with my children when they were younger. Even now as teenagers they often get in the spirit. I have included crafts that you can do mostly by yourself, or can be turned into a family event.

Hand Spiders

Materials needed:

- · Black or brown construction paper
- · A white crayon
- · Scissors
- · Scrap pieces of construction paper or material (a different color than your spider)
- · Glue or glue sticks
- 1. Put you open hand on the black/brown construction paper
- 2. With the white crayon trace around you whole hand and fingers, except your thumb. (Make two for each spider)
- 3. Cut the hand shapes out and glue together (the pieces should overlap) so you have fingers on each side
- 4. On one end (not on a finger end) glue round pieces of scrap material or paper for eyes (You can also use wiggly eyes if you wish.)
- 5. After all the glue is dry, and with the eyes facing up, fold all the legs down, to finish your spider.

Ghostly Milk Jugs

Materials needed:

- · Clean plastic milk/orange juice jugs, gallon size
- · Black permanent marker
- · Craft knife (this will need a grownup)
- · String of low wattage holiday lights (50 lights or more)
- Make sure your jugs have been cleaned out very well
- 2. Leave the caps on the jugs while you draw ghost eyes and mouths on the jugs
- 3. Ask a grownup to cut a 2 or 3 in round hole in the back of each jug.
- 4. Set the jugs next to each other and stuff part of the light string in each jug
- 5. Plug in and enjoy

Hint: You can make the lights blink for added effect

Ghost suckers

Materials needed:

- · suckers on a stick (Dum Dums, Tootsie Pops, etc.)
- · Plain napkins or paper towels
- · A black marker
- · String or thin ribbon
- 1. Leave the wrapper on the suckers and cover with the napkin or sheet of paper towel
- 2. Use the string or ribbon to tie the napkin/towel to the sucker, tie around the stick
- 3. Use a marker to make the face

Hint: You can use another piece of ribbon to hang your ghost up.

Dirt Cups

Materials needed:

· Chocolate pudding

* Clear plastic cups

- A package of regular Oreo cookies
- · Package of gummy worms or gummy bugs

Preparation:

- 1. Take apart the cookies, all you need is the outer cookie parts, put them in a gallon size zipper bag and mash them up.
- 2. Mix the chocolate pudding according to the directions
- 3. In the bottom of the cup, put a thin layer of cookies crumbs
- 4. Scoop in some pudding, add a few worms or bugs and some more pudding
- 5. Sprinkle the top with more crumbs and put another worm or bug
- 6. Put in the refrigerator for at least one hour, enjoy.

Ghosts...this is the time of year when lots of people think about ghosts. But for some, ghosts are a year long event. When I was little I could see ghosts, all of the time. But I was not lucky enough to grow up in a pagan family, and my parents got mad when I tried to talk to them about the ghost. It was hard for me because I did not know what to do then, and most of the time the ghost made me feel scared.

If you see a ghost on a regular basis, talk to your parents or pagan adult you trust, they will listen to you. And here are a few things to remember...

- · If you can see ghosts, or even hear them, you are not crazy, nothing is wrong with you
- Not all ghosts are bad. Sometimes when someone who loves us a lot dies, their spirit comes by to check on us
- You can tell any ghost that you do not want them to be around you right now. It's ok for you to tell them to please go away and come back later.
- If there is a ghost that make you feel scared or unhappy tell your parents or pagan adult right away, Don't let ghosts that scare you hang around.
- · You can put salt on your window sill and small pieces of tin foil taped to the window (shiny side out) for extra protection
- · If your parents will let you, burning sage or cedar chips in your room will cleanse your space
- · Black Tourmaline, Jasper, and Jet are all stone that can be useful in protection against ghosts that bother you.

Coloring Page



In a mixing bowl, combine vegetable oil, chocolate, and granulated sugar. Blend in eggs, one at a time, stirring well after each addition. Add vanilla. Stir in flour, baking powder, and salt into oil mixture. Chill overnight.

Next Day: Preheat oven to 350° F. Roll about a Tbsp. of dough into a ball. Drop balls into confectioner's sugar, and roll until coated. Place balls about 2" apart on a greased baking sheet. Bake for 10-12 minutes. The cakes should be soft and the edges firm. Do not over bake; they burn easily.




Wormy's Review



Summary: What a wonderful retelling of Edward Spenser's *The Fairie Queene*. The text is simple and engaging—a good read-aloud for any age child. What makes it a wonderful book, however, is the dynamic art work by Hyman. Each page has hundreds of elements that, even if the child bores of looking at the text related image, will engage the child further. Each page features different borders ranging from simple floral arrangements, to checkerboard patterns, to hidden images of angels and elves.

Wormy's Thoughts: While the text is enjoyable for anyone and the illustrations are flamboyant and whimsical, the images do get a little graphic and dark at times. Please remember that this is a serious story, even in a simplified version. One particular image did turn me off from giving this book two smiles—when Saint George kills the dragon, the image shows blood pouring out of the dragon. While this is an imaginary situation because of the mythical elements, the image is still rather life-like and can be scary to some children. Consider this when reading it, and remember to preview the book yourself, so that you are prepared to discuss any questions your child may have. If you want your children to know this story, you may want to consider a gentler version, such as *Saint George and the Dragon* by Geraldine McCaughrean (ISBN 192723766). Happy reading!

'The exchange of energy in your writing subject and yourself is the difference in a standard writing piece and a great piece of work.

For many, connecting with your subject through energy is a hard thing to understand. The best way to truly comprehend something is to experience it. The Creative Corner assignment is to learn how to share energy with the subject of writings.

- Keep track of your local weather and try to spend some time out in the different kinds. Be sure to meditate, play in, and watch closely each weather phase you

Hypatia of Alexandria is considered one of the earliest female mathematicians. While the date of her birth is not conclusive, historians believe Hypatia was born c. 350 AD in Alexandria, Egypt.

Her father, Theon, began teaching her philosophy, astronomy and mathematics at a very early age. As well as academic studies, her father encouraged her to take care of her body, by giving her daily exercises to perform.

Although she was Pagan, Hypatia was respected and liked by her Christian peers. She was a great teacher, and is credited with creating the first hydrometer.

Hypatia's love of learning may be one reason historians believed she was the keeper of the Library of Alexandria. What they do know is that she was a great teacher, and loved to share what she knew with others.

- Geothermal power has become very popular due to the oil shortage. However, this type of power can be harmful to the environment. What are some ways the geothermal energies could be used without hurting the land?



Scientist Spotlight

John Tyndall 1820—1893



John Tyndall is known for his many accomplishments, mostly for proving that greenhouse gasses existed, and was the first to make a hypothesis on their effect to the world. He was very dedicated to science and donated much of his earnings back into it. He spent a lot of his time experimenting and delivering speeches in many places throughout the world. He was a pioneer who laid down the path for us to take notice of Gaia and other things around us. Outside of being a scientist he spent his life standing up for the earth and for his disbelief in the organized religions of his time.

Pagan Focus

- John spent a lot of time with nature. He thought it to be a wonder in itself. He climbed mountains and overcame extreme weather just to spend some time with Gaia.
- He stood up for his own beliefs without ever actually telling what they were. He did, however, voice his opinion on the things happening around him and was the first to go above and beyond to see things right.

Science Lab Book

Topic

Inspiration: Greenhouse gases are destroying Gaia.

Question: How does this actually happen?

Hypothesis: Try to guess the answer to the question as well as the reasons why you think that way.

Lab: Learn more about what greenhouse gases are and see how they affect the atmosphere. Follow the steps below to achieve this:

- Put a thermometer in a glass and place it mouth down on a book. Set it outside or near a sunlamp.
- Place another thermometer beside the glass but on the book and not in a shadow.
- After both have been setting there a fair amount of time move the book in the shade or house and observe the time it takes for them to cool down.

The thermometer in the glass represents how the earth is because of greenhouse gases.

* try to put different things into the glass before trying this experiment again to see how different things affect greenhouse gases.

Conclusion: Write the conclusion you reached after holding the experiment.

Opinion/Grade: Write your own grade or opinion on this month's lab and your involvement in it.

Greenhouse Gasses

The whole world has begun to take notice of greenhouse gases. Being Pagan and having a special connection with Gaia, means that we should take a closer look.

Although this topic can be found sprinkled all over the news and in environmental news, it is not totally understood by everyone. Don't let this get you down; even those that do the preaching about it and how to prevent it are not that familiar with it.

In its simplest terms, greenhouse gases are gases that are man made or made as an effect of man's doings that are released into the air. These gases are not naturally in there or as much as is there now. The gases mess up with the way Gaia and nature cools itself, causing heat to stay near the surface longer. This is causing a lot of problems. The waters are affected, the glaciers are melting, the weather is crazy, and many other things.

As a good Pagan you should do all you can to assure you are helping Gaia in her time of need. Do some research to find the things that contribute to greenhouse gases and see if you can do a little to eliminate a few of them from your own world.

Do some serious thinking on the concept of greenhouse gases, their effects on the world, how to cut it back, and the other aspects of the subject. See if you can come to a hypothesis as to what lesson Gaia is trying to teach here and why this lesson is being so drastic.

Foreign Language

Vocabulary

Vocabulary can be a great lesson in any foreign language. Just working with the words can bring forth many other aspects of study and insight to the culture that uses the language now and in the future. Below are some idea's how to incorporate a more Pagan focused vocabulary lesson in your foreign language study.

- Use the vocabulary list in the English section of Pagan Moonbeams throughout the month. You may find that many words are not actually in the regular vocabulary of certain languages. You may have to do extra studying or research to find a way to communicate the vocabulary word and/or its meaning in your chosen language.
- Use the vocabulary words in your regular lessons to tell a Pagan focused story. You may have to tell the story in your common language and merely use the known foreign words when they come up. You can also use the internet translation wizards (like Dictionary.com) or your textbook/program to learn the story in it's entirety in the language you have chosen to study.
- Think of a Pagan centered lesson or idea that involves one of your vocabulary words and draw a picture to illustrate it. When done, think of a one word-sentence that will sum up the definition of the illustration, idea, or intent. Be sure to properly use and spell your vocabulary word in it, even if you don't know the other words in the foreign language you are using.
- Write each vocabulary word in a Pagan focused sentence. Be sure that your vocabulary word is not only spelled right, but that it is used properly in the sentence.

Hopefully, with these idea starters, you will be able to make a more rounded vocabulary lesson as well as improve your foreign language Pagan connection.

Non-Foreign Language Learners

Even if you aren't in the process of learning a foreign language, you might consider learning some of your root Pagan language.

Research or ask an adult what the root language is that is connected with your Pagan religion. Some will have several languages connected to them and you will have to choose which one you wish to pursue.

Each time you work with a list of vocabulary or spelling words, pick a certain number of them to learn in both your native tongue and the native tongue of your Pagan ancestors. Not only will you connect to your Pagan roots through language, you will also find the energy from your magickal past.

Finding a Language

Searching for a foreign language can be a hard thing to do. Usually, the common languages are given to you in a list form and you just randomly pick one. Many people who can speak a foreign language have not actually taken the time to 'feel' and 'connect' with it.

As you go on your own search finding a foreign language to learn, go outside of the box and find one that fits you. Take the time to make a list of languages that connect with something else you like about those that do or have spoken it. Look at the customs and beliefs of those who call the language their native tongue. When language is felt, its heart is reflected in all things connected with it. Take some time to hear the language spoken in a creative form (poems, songs, stories, etc...). Observe the traditional dress and dances that surround the language. Look closely at people who speak it and get familiar with their everyday life to see if you can connect in anyway with it.

Finding the foreign language that connects with you will make learning it a great adventure. You will also be anxious to learn it and your heart will be shown as it is spoken. You will find much more than a way to communicate. You will find a new avenue to express and/or display yourself.

Pen pals are an important learning tool when trying to learn about a new language. They will share with you a complete picture of the language. One example of a place to find a Pagan pen pal is

Middle Magic

Writing Magick Pt. 1 of 3

Writing magical works is something that most people do because they feel that if they write it themselves, it will have better results. It also personalizes the experience itself. You have probably been writing your own magical works for a while now, and have pretty much mastered it. It is important that you never take anything you do in Paganism as 'learned' or 'finished'. Taking steps back and rethinking or learning about the new things that have been discovered, as well as stumbled on, can bring the best results and offer the best teaching, as well. A seasoned Pagan should know that lessons come to them when they need to learn it, but they must always search for knowledge, because without it, the lessons will be overlooked. Although there are many different ways to approach writing your own magick, the basics will more or less be the same.

In this section, there will be no actual direction for you to write your own magick, because that is an individualized art that could never be directed. Instead, the section will contain things to consider and reflect on when writing your own magickal works.

Physical Writing

- Numerology has been used when choosing certain words or phrases within magickal works to assure they are strong.
- Coded works dot throughout history. There is also a belief that once someone writes a work, it is only powerful for the writer, and can be tainted if other's freely read it.
- Names of certain parts of writing could be considered sacred, so not only are they chosen well, they are also researched to the roots.
- Interpretation of words can be taken differently, so many take into consideration who or what the work will be directed to. You may find time or subject-specific grammar in works to accompany the focus of the work.
- The letter formation may be altered to only be used during the writing of magickal works. This is so regular handwriting does not give insight to the writer, his/her mood, or situation surrounding the need for the writing itself.

Automatic Writing

There will be times you will just pick up a pen and everything seems to roll. Words come out and they form the best and most powerful magick. Although strange, you should never fear this form of writing. The unconscious mind or that from another plane or person has a desire to share with you.

Although this type of writing is sporadic, it is totally amazing to experience. During this, do not think of specifics at all. Instead, clear your mind and allow the powerful forces to take over.

When all is said and done, the same power that aided you in writing it will let you know what to do next.

The Magickal Diary

Consider using a magickal diary. The purpose for this diary is to be where only the dynamics of your magickal works go into. It can operate as an outlet, as well as a resource, for many years to come. Tracking your magickal growth can lead to a more balanced spiritual world for you.

Magickal Etiquette

- Never harm others with the use of magick. There is a possibility of mishap.
- Be positive that you have exhausted all other avenues before resorting to magick.
- Double check the true purpose, and be sure it is actually needed and not just wanted. Also, be sure that the focus is actually going to fix things and not add to them in the end.
- Never do any magickal work of any kind on someone without their permission and knowledge first.
- Be prepared for the outcome you are working for. If doing it for someone else, be sure they are prepared for it
- Before writing and/or using magickal works, be sure that all angles have been taken into consideration.
 This means the physical, spiritual, and religious angles for what you write as well as your purpose.
- Keep focused and be sure that you really want to carry out things. Without whole heart and soul, the whole process could be useless.

- She accompanied Sir William Flinders Petrie on several archaeology excavations, one of which was in 1912 and caused her to be sick. This incident was believed to ignite her interest in Witchcraft.
- For three years, she held the position of President of the Folklore Society.
- She wrote the book *The God of Witches*, and it was totally ignored until it's second print, right after WWII.
- She was a pioneer in the unwrapping of mummies, with her unwrapping of what is labeled 'the two brothers'.
- Her book, *The Divine King in England*, followed Henry I and claimed he had ritually killed many prominent royalty for his own gain.

Psychic Investigating

When Margaret went to the crime scene with pen and paper to investigate the happenings there, she was actually doing Psychic Investigating.

Psychic Investigation is where a person who is in touch with the past and present forms of life works between the two to come to a conclusion.

Although everyone is not in touch with both the living and the dead, it is fun to explore the concept. Try to do your own psychic investigating by following the steps below.

- 1. Walk around in your area until you find a spot that feels a little uneasy to you.
- 2. Take regular visits to the area with an adult. Make sure that each time you go you take a notebook and/or drawing pad and have a clear, open mind.
- 3. When you get to the area, document the things you see that are signs of what happened there recently. Be sure to look at both the natural and man-made signs. Document your findings.
- 4. Pick the place where you see the most activity and sit or stand in the middle of it. Clear your mind; you may even want to go into a meditative state if it helps you to unclutter your mind. Document the things that come to you when you are totally open.
- 5. When done, go home and evaluate your findings. You may want to keep each visit's conclusion as a piece of a puzzle for a bigger message.

Local Pagan Spotlight Cara Louise

Cara Louise is a local Pagan author that lives in the county of Devon, in England. As the current featured author in my book shop, I thought it would be a nice idea to interview her, so we could get to know her a little bit better, and her inspiration that goes into her writing. She is always very cheerful and very professional. She loves to write and has come up with her own series of books which focus on Paganism. I think she is a great writer and an excellent source of knowledge for children. I have found that it is very difficult to find good children's books written by Pagan authors, and I am really glad that she managed to find my details and contact me. The interview I gave her is below; I hope you like learning about her as much as I liked sharing her info with you.



How long have you been a Pagan and what path do you follow?

I follow a path of my own making really. It twists and turns and takes me where I never expect to go. When I was very young, I talked to wizards in my back garden and had strange dreams about lilly men. At secondary school, I organized my friends to carry out rituals at a stone during break time. The teachers never found out.

Where are you from?

I was born in Cleethorpes. The men in my mother's family were Grimsby trawler men, and the women were ballet dancers. When I was 3, we moved to Farnham in Surrey, my father's home town. I grew up surrounded by nature and loved flowers and trees. I was always climbing up trees and making dens in bracken.

Were you raised in a pagan home? If not, what inspired you to become a Pagan?

My father was raised as a Catholic. He hated religion. So did my mother. So they raised me and my brothers with no religion. We had the usual Christian religious education at school which I rejected. My Dad had various supernatural magazines which fascinated me. I was always into ghosts and magic. But it was not until my twenties, when a friend told me about ley lines, that I started to put everything together and discovered Paganism and Earth Mysteries.

What was your inspiration to start writing Pagan Children's books?

I was working in the Central Library at Southend-on-Sea, putting back books in the Children's Section. I had been writing since I was 6 but was never sure what kind of thing I wanted to write. I felt my style was quite simple. I felt Earth Mysteries was my path and I clearly remember deciding in the library that I wanted to combine children's fiction and Earth Mysteries.

Do you have any more books that you are currently writing?

Currently I am working on publishing the ones I have already written. I have 12 novels only available as e-books on my website which I want to record as Talking Books.

Do you teach your children about Paganism?

I don't have children of my own. I feel that writing children's books is a great responsibility and a privilege. I feel all children everywhere are mine. To me, the most important thing on the planet is teaching children to look after the Earth and the more people I reach the better.

What is your favorite Pagan holiday and how do you celebrate it?

Probably Summer Solstice, as I love the sun, long days and hot weather. Last year, though, I was in Brazil for the Winter Solstice, and in the evening, I sat looking up at the stars of the Southern Hemisphere. It was so warm and beautiful, the air full of fireflies and the chirping of crickets. At Solstices and Equinoxes, I just sit quietly, and am aware of the cycles of the year.

What advice or message would you tell today's Pagan kids?

Look after the planet! It's the only one we've got!





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Underworld God / Goddess

This issue is a special focus on the Underworld. We have covered information on several of our highlight Pantheons. The Underworld is the place in which the souls of the dead are believed to go. Each culture has its own version of what happens to the souls of humans when they die. Most propose a place where the souls are judged by their conduct on earth and then receive either punishment or rewards based on that behavior.

Here are some highlights from cultures around the globe:

Africa-

The Bantu believe the souls of the dead go to the underground world of Ku-zimu. When the souls get upset they cause earthquakes.

For some Swahili, Ku-zimu is underwater and the souls of the dead live like fish on the bottom.

Ethiopians call the underworld Ekera.

Aztec-

Their nine level underworld, called Mictlan, was a gloomy place at the center of the earth. To get there, the dead had to cross eight forests, eight deserts, and eight mountains, each full of danger. The first level of Mictlan is a river. Souls who survived the journey found rest in the last level of the underworld, called Chicuauhmictlan.

East India-

For the Papuan, the underworld, Hiyoyoa, lies under the sea and is ruled by Tumudurere.

Inuit-

The good souls travel to Qudlivum. Adlivum is the undersea world for sinners. Those who are not so bad will find less torment in a lower section called Adliparmiut.

Jain-

Their underworld has seven layers and each is ruled by a different god, who deals out his/her own fiendish torture.

Persian-

The souls of the dead are judged by Mithra, Rashnu, and Sraosha. Those found worthy were allowed to cross a bridge to the heavens, those found unworthy fell to Druj a place of torment.

South American—

In Bolivia, it is believed the souls travel to the land of Grandfather (Tamoi). Getting there is not easy; first, the souls must cross two rivers, one by ferry, and one by a floating log. If they fall off, they are eaten by fish. Next, they are judged by Izoitamoi, who splits evil souls in half. Those who are still whole after that test go through the Land of the Darkness, using as a torch a small straw which had been placed in their grave. The soul must gather humming-bird feathers to give to Tamoi. Next, the soul must pass between the clashing rocks known as Hacaru. Then, the soul will be tested by a gallinazo bird, tickled by a monkey and pass the Speaking Tree. Now they can finally reach the land of Tamoi, where they live happily ever after.

Incas believed their ancestors came from the underworld, which many tribes believed was the source of life on earth.

Thai-

The underworld (Patal) is ruled by Maiyarab. Souls enter through the hollow stalk of the Lotus and then cross a lake guarded by Machanu before being judged.

Welsh-

The underworld is know as Annwfn and is ruled by Arawn

Pacific Islands-

For the married Fijian, the underworld is Bulu. To enter, the married man must throw the tooth of a whale (which is given to them) at a certain tree. If he hits the tree he is allowed to proceed, if he misses he will have to return to his grave. Those that pass meet their former wives and they travel together. Next, he must defeat a demon that attacks them to go further. If not, he is eaten by the demon. They must then pass through two caves, Cibaciba and Drakulu. The couple is then taken by boat to Nabangatai, and then before Dengei to be judged. Single men are smashed to death on rocks by Nangananga.

In Hawaii, the souls of the dead travel to Hawaiki or Poluta, either in the sky or under the earth.

For the people of Mindanao, the underworld is Gimokodan. One section is for the spirits of warriors and the other is for every one else. A giantess with many nipples suckles the spirits of dead infants.

Pantheon Focus

Every two months a topic will be covered in whole by the pantheon's; Greek, Egyptian, Norse, Roman, Celtic, Roman, and Native American. Because the pantheon's were introduced and/or studied through time views and information within them have changed. While you are reading the pages in this section there are a few things we would like for you to keep in mind. Each pantheon's information can be found below and it should be read before you begin into the deep studies of any specific pantheon.

Remember these main facts:

- Even though a certain pantheon believes specific things about a God or Goddess this doesn't mean that you have to use those avenues to believe and/or connect with them. The God and Goddess will reach you in a way that will work best for the two of you as one individual.
- Even though a set of Gods and Goddess are usually presented together does not mean that you have to follow each and every one of them. Within most pantheon's there are many different God and Goddess' that are connected with the same thing so you do not have to follow a complete set, the ancient truest Pagan's didn't; this is why there are differences in the pantheon to begin with. There are also people that connect with God and Goddess' from different pantheons. When it comes down to it you will go with those that connect or call out to you, those are the one's that need you and/or are to direct you in your journey through life.

Greek Pantheon

The Greek pantheon has stayed very constant over the centuries. This is largely due to the tradition of oral or verbal passage of the god and goddess stories, ancient Greek literature, and art. Understanding this we will cover the original pantheons worshipped by ancient Greeks and throughout the ages.

Roman Pantheon

The Roman pantheon contain a tremendous number of God and Goddess as well as some that have changed in name. This is because the ancient Romans seemed to have allowed culture, rulers, and surrounding areas to influence the names of their Gods. In this section the most well-known God and Goddess' known in this pantheon will be covered.

Norse Pantheon

Norse pantheon is a collection of gods and goddess from the northern Germanic tribes. Norse mythology remained mostly unchanged during the Christian movement. This could have been due largely to the fact that the Norse gods and goddess were based on real people. Unlike other cultures, Norse gods were mortal and had to eat.

Celtic Pantheon

The Celtic Pantheon and the God and Goddess that comprise it are quite vast. The major factors that separate the individual Gods are time period and physical location. For the most part during this series the main God and Goddess followed during time periods will be covered. It will follow the three time periods that Lady Gregory presented.

Egyptian Pantheon

In the Egyptian pantheon there are over 70 God and Goddess'. It would be extremely hard to cover each and everyone. Great effort will be taken to cover in depth the most well-known God & Goddess' and small notes recognizing the lessor known one's as well. The information will also be from the most common stories and information available.

Native American Pantheon

There are many tribes and beliefs that fall into this category. Although it will be impossible to cover all of these variables the major believes will be combined into common practices. A list will also be presented with the names of the most common God and Goddess for the major tribes.

Throughout your studies of the God and Goddess' within any pantheon it might be in your best interest to regularly consult and/or discuss the material presented with your parents and/or another Pagan adult. You may want to do your own research as well. Opinions and information will not always agree so you will need to do some personal inner research to find the correct way from within and guidance from the Gods themselves.

Norse Underworld God

Norse mythology was passed down verbally in the form of poetry. When it was later written, the writers kept with the prose format, in order to keep the stories as intact as possible. This, along with the fact that the deities themselves were based on actual people, puts it more into a folklore category than mythology. Another interesting difference in Norse mythology is the lack of good vs. evil. The representation of tales seem to be more like order vs. chaos, with short interludes of camaraderie.

Hel Topics

God's World:

Helheim (Hel Hall) is in the last and deepest realm of the Underworld, Niflheim, which consists of nine realms.

Niflheim was designated as the final dwelling place for souls that did not die gloriously in battle, and is located under the third root of the Yggdrasil tree. Helheim is viewed as being dark, cold and damp, filled with misery and hunger. Helheim is surrounded by an impassable lake and is guarded by Modug.

History:

Hel is the daughter of the god Loki and the giantess Angrboda. Hel is a hideously looking half dead hag. Her legs are gangrene and she is half blue. Hel was banished to the underworld by Odin after he learned of her existence. But she was given complete control of the whole of Helheim.

Myth Topic

It had been prophesied that at the end of the world, Ragnarok, the good gods would be defeated by the children of Loki. So, when Odin discovered that Loki had children by the giantess Angrboda, he banished them to the ends of the earth. The Midgard Serpent was banished to the sea. Fenris, the giant wolf, was bound. And Hel was banished to Niflheim.

Niflheim ("Mistland") is the realm of ice and cold, said to be beneath the earth and surrounded by the river Giall. It lies beneath the Yggdrasil's third root, near Hvergelmir and Nastrond. Located north of Ginnungagap, and there dwells the Rimtursir, and here, also, Helgardh is located.

Niflheim was broken into several layers: Spirits of the slain warriors went Valhalla in Asgard, home of the gods, or were taken by Freya to her palace.

Another layer was reserved for the elderly, the sick, and those who were unable to die gloriously in battle and enter Valhalla. Niflheim could also be entered by crossing the bridge over the Giall, guarded by Modgud, to whom the passer had to pay a tribute of blood.

Next came the area of Ironwood, where the trees had metal leaves and the entrance gates were guarded by the dog, Garm. Inside, the cold and darkness, was Elvidnir, or Helgardh,

Hela Hell

also known as ("house of mists") the hall of Hel, ruler of Niflheim, where spirits were judged. Criminals were consigned to Nastrond, and were eaten by the serpent Nidhogg.

Celtic Underworld God/Goddess

The Celtic pantheon consists of many Gods and Goddesses that contradict and/or compliment one another. In ancient times the Celtic world was separated by time periods and/or physical location and each had their own set of God/Goddess' which they followed. Today not all of the ancient God/Goddess are worshipped individually, some are combined and referred to by an adapted name of the most commonly known one or that of the last surviving God/Goddess groups. Much effort will be taken to introduce you to the many God & Goddesses that are now labeled Celtic.

Underworld God/Goddess

The Underworld:

The underworld was viewed by the ancient people as a bright place. The stories of what it actually looked like changes according to the person, time, and place that it comes from. What is known is that, before the introduction of Christianity, the underworld was a great place to live and was sought after by most. It is believed that the underworld was an actual physical place that resembled the lands of those that believe in it. You can find many writings that tell of how to find the physical location of it. Although all do not agree, it is believed that the land was a part of the known world, and not on a different plane or magickal place.

Living in the Underworld:

When one was to pass over to the underworld, they were usually escorted. Depending on the individual belief and time period, the escort would go by different names. Some of the most common would be Sucellus/Greenman or Barintius, using a chariot. Once there, they would live in peace and happiness with the other residents and there would be a God that would rule over the whole underworld, as well as a god that would protect it. It was believed that there were great fields, crops, animals and all other things needed to make the perfect world. Today, not everyone believes in the underworld that walk the Celtic path. For those that do believe, it is basically the same as it started out and we still desire to be there.

The Otherworld

The otherworld is a special place that many go. In ancient times, the sidhe and special places in the water were portals to it. There are those that believe the underworld and otherworld are the same, and others believe that they are different places. You will also find people that only believe in one and that the other one does not exist.

In writings, the otherworld seems to be talked about more than the underworld; however, it might be because the name changed. The otherworld is a belief of the later ancients and most people today. In stories, both ancient and modern, the otherworld is visited by many common people. It is usually a magical story where they are swept away by residence of the otherworld or they stumble upon it accidentally.

The otherworld doesn't actually have a common description of what it looks like and seems to take on the image of a great, happy place to the person that goes there. Most always it contains parties, dancing, and lots of happy people.

When leaving the otherworld as a person, you will return to the world no older than the time you left, even though many years may have passed. There are souls that live there, most of them are considered dead, and they share the otherworld with the ever living Gods & Goddesses.

Dressing the Underworld God/dess

When dressing your Celtic underworld God or Goddess, you will need to do research. Find out what other things the God or Goddess of your choice ruled over. You can dress him/her with items that represent both the things they rule over and the underworld.

Since it seems that the underworld was bright and cheerful, it might be a good idea to dress him/her with bright colorful clothing. Take into consideration that most Goddesses, when dressed, are seen to be in a dress with pants under it. The God's are usually highly decorated with armor, bags, and other things that show their strength.

Egyptian Underworld God

The Egyptian pantheon is quite vast, but does contain the original gods and goddesses. The variations in gods or goddesses was often a result of the pharaohs. In the times of the pharaohs it was not uncommon for the pantheon to change based on the deities of the pharaohs' choosing. However, upon the death of the pharaoh of the current time, the culture would quickly revert to worship of the original deities until the next pharaoh decided to change them, if he desired to do so. This practice was common up until the influence, and later conquer, of the Romans.

Osiris

God of the Underworld and Vegetation

The Underworld:

There are two descriptions of the underworld. When referred to as Duat, the underworld is a peaceful place of rest, where each evening Ra travels through to bring light to the souls who dwell there. Duat is believed to be located on the dark side of the moon. The other version describes the underworld as a place of horror and evil monsters that must be carefully maneuvered by the use of spells and incantations. Both versions agree that the journey to the underworld is a difficult venture. This is the reason behind the writing of spells and magickal instruction on the walls of the tombs. They were direction and guidance for the souls of loved ones.

History:

The story of Osiris is one of the most important stories in Egyptian Lore and is still told today. Osiris was given this title after being murdered three times by his brother Seth (Set) and then brought back to life by his wife/sister Isis. There are several versions of the story of Osiris' death. Osiris is also known as the God of Vegetation and later became the God of the Dead, replacing Anubis. It is believed that he dies and is reborn again each year, which secures his position as God of the Underworld.

Myth Topic

Ancient Egyptians were passionate about the afterlife. This is evident in the intricate rituals surrounding burial and body preparation, as well as the detailed stories of the path to the underworld. After death, it is believed the spirit is led by Osiris to the Halls of Truth where Anubis, God of the Dead, waits to weigh the heart against the Feather of Truth, and Thoth records the events. If the heart is found to be heavy with sin the soul is devoured by Ammut, a goddess of the Underworld. This event is also viewed by the forty-two judges of souls.

The Egyptians believed the body must be properly prepared thru mummification, a process that can take up to seventy days, during which the organs of the body were carefully removed and preserved in canopic jars. The body itself was lined with resin inside and out and wrapped in linen. The heart was left in the body because it was believed to contain the soul.

The tombs of the dead were lined with text from any of the books created as instructions and directions: the Pyramid Text, the Coffin text, the Book of the Dead, the Book of Gates, or the Book of Secret Chambers. The text written in the tombs were magickal spells meant to aid the soul in its journey to the Underworld.

The Names of Osiris

Asar Unneffer Winefred Not one tomb contains a complete book, but sections from several. Originally mummification was only available for the pharaohs and wealthy families. Later, it was made available to a wider group of people, as well as family pets.

Quick Osiris Facts

- Osiris is the only god in Egyptian lore to have died: he died 3 times
- The rising of the Nile each year is believed to be symbolic of his death and resurrection
- Death is so important to Egyptians that Osiris at one point was honored more than the creator god
- Osiris was the god of vegetation before he was the god of the underworld
- Osiris is the oldest son of Geb or Ra and Nut
- Brother to Isis, Nepthys, and Set
- Father to Horus and later Anubis (by Nepthys)

Dressing Osiris

Osiris was depicted in human form wrapped up as a mummy, holding the crook and flail. He was often depicted with green skin, alluding to his role as a God of Vegetation. He wore a crown known as the 'atef', composed of the tall conical white crown of Upper Egypt with red plumes on each side.

Native American Underworld God/Goddess

The Native American pantheon consists of more God/Goddesses, or Kachinas, coming from so many regions, cultures and tribes, making it impossible to make a steady list. There are a few that will have the same position in different tribes and go by a different name, however, the changes in the two will not allow them to be combined. The Native Americans are actually very private about some parts of their religion, and both new and ancient titles and sexes of those worshiped are vast and sacred. All effort has been taken to provide information without toying with the sacredness of those who follow this path

Underworld Spirits

Guide to the afterworld, both for physical person and spirit

The World:

The Underworld takes on different looks and forms in the Native American world. Although there are some Underworld gods, for the most part this job is taken on by a goddess. There is usually no judging or provoking done by those that rule the underworld. The major job they have is seeing that things go as they are to go.

History:

The histories of the Underworld spirits are varied in the Native American pantheon. Because death and things that happen before and after are very sacred to those in this pantheon, a solid history of the underworld itself is not present in most beliefs. Usually, there is a myth that explains how a god or goddess came to live there. The most well-known spirits associated with the underworld are not actually residents or in charge of it, but more often those that are visited on your way to, or as you leave, the path towards the underworld. Most underworld spirits are attached to those that bring life; closing the circle of life.

Mother Spider

You should always show respect to the Mother Spider because she rules the inner earth where you go when you leave the world we are in now. There will be times when she makes her appearance to you, and you will want to talk to her. This is not a wise choice, you, instead, are to set her out an offering and carry on with your work.

If those who do not know about her cross her path, they will be in a spell, just like the one that you will be in once you pass on. She will lead you to her home under a rock and you will then come to a magickal land full of paths and tunnels.

It is important that you use your own intuition and watch signs carefully. The children will be your guides through this place, and it is important that you follow the correct path: the one they show you. The wrong path could be of grave danger to you. The most important thing to remember is that if Children are permitted to be someplace it is surely safe.

Remember, the journey through the tunnels and caves will be your last.

Color: This hardy plant has fleshy, spindle-shaped roots, pale colored when young ,older plant is dark brown with dark green glossy leaves, bright colored flowers. There are over 100 varieties of Aconite; flowers can be large and eyecatching blue, purple, white, yellow or pink, with numerous stamens.

Location: Lower mountain slopes of the North portion of Eastern Hemisphere, from Himalayas through Europe, to Great Britain. Found in parts of England, mainly the western counties and South Wales, the Swiss Alps, Salzburg, North Tyrol and Vorarlberg, Germany, Spain, and Japan Healing Properties: Aconite is extremely poisonous, but in minute doses has a wide range of medical uses. Apple Magick

Perhaps one of the most celebrated plants in all of history and legend, the apple is symbolic of immortality and reincarnation. The apple represents the cycle of life, death and rebirth. In many tales, the Apple is the World Tree, the axis of the worlds, and it is often a doorway to the realms of Faery. Known as the Oghamic tree, "Quert" to the Druids, it was the "silver bough," which could be used to open the doors between the realms so that shamans might journey to meet with the departed and gain healing and oracular powers. Apples were often given as gifts to humans by the gods, and apples are sometimes believed to confer psychic power.

As a symbol of beauty, the Apple of Discord was to determine the most beautiful of the goddesses, and thus started the Trojan War. The fruit of apple trees are associated with health, for their abundance of medicinal uses, from cleansing the teeth to relieving indigestion, to relieving fevers, etc.

Apple trees grow abundant fruit, and thus it is also associated with the principles of generosity and abundance. It is symbolic of love and fertility, and is considered an aphrodisiac. It was often shared by lovers, and in Gypsy weddings, was shared by the bride and groom.

If bisected, the apple shows a pentagram at its core, thus it symbolized protection and the Goddess. Apples are also sacred to the Celtic horse and Underworld goddess Rhiannon. Abbelio was the Gallic apple deity of the Garrone valley. It also represented the Celtic triple goddess of healing, inspiration and smith craft. Brigid possessed an Otherworldly apple orchard to which bees traveled to obtain its magickal nectar.

Use apples to open the doorways into Faerie, spells for love, harmony, beauty, inspiration, illumination, healing, horses or travel, enhancing any skill, abundance, generosity, harvest, and magick of divine, shamanic madness or visionary experience.

The Apple and the Mirror

Before the stroke of midnight, sit in front of a mirror in a room lit only by one candle or the moon. Go into the silence, and ask a question. Cut the apple into nine pieces. With your back to the mirror, eat eight of the pieces, and then throw the ninth over your left shoulder. Turn your head to look over the same shoulder, and you will see and in image or symbol in the mirror that will tell you your answer.

(When you look in the mirror, let your focus go "soft," and allow the patterns made by the moon or candlelight and shadows to suggest forms, symbols and other dreamlike images that speak to your intuition.)

Apple Peeling Magick

- · One method was used if someone had a very important question. The apple is peeled very carefully so that the questioner ends up with a long unbroken peel. The question is asked and the peel is thrown over the shoulder. The answer is "No" if it falls in the shape of an "U" or an "O" and it is "Yes" if it is anything else.
- · Around the time of All Hallows Eve, you can find out the name of your true love. To do so, peel an apple peel strip while reciting:

A, B, C, X, Y, Z Let my true love be revealed to me.

Then blow on the apple peel strip and drop it into a bowl of water. The peel will unfold into the first letter of your true love's name.

· Another very popular form of a peeling prediction was one that allowed a girl to find out who her future husband would be. The apple was peeled, again in one long continuous piece, and thrown over her left shoulder. If the peel remained unbroken, it would fall in the shape of the initial of her future spouse. If the peel broke, she would remain unmarried.

Apple games

Traditionally speaking, the girls were to polish, mark and then float an apple in the tub of water. The boy that retrieved her apple with his bite would be her spouse.

There is another apple game for boys called Snap Apple. Apples are hung from the ceiling on strings; the boys leap and try to sink their teeth into them. The first boy to bite into an apple would be the first to marry.





To The Parent

Astrology for Parents—Part 2



Last month, I introduced the concept of applying basic astrology concepts to parenting. I will explore further, but I need to backtrack a little. As I reviewed my article from last month, I realized that I skipped over some basic astrological concepts that are important enough to review here.

A chart consists, simply, of a circle divided into twelve parts. These parts are called houses, beginning with the first house just under the horizon on the left side. Just like a mile marker on a road trip, the planets' locations are determined by degrees, as if the heavens were a flat, two-dimensional circle around the earth, measuring 360°. Each house represents a piece of the pie where the angle of the point of the pie piece is 30 degrees.

A basic Natal Chart is usually created for by calculating the location of the planets in the sky at the moment of birth. The first calculations made are the Ascendant (or Zodiac on the horizon at the time of birth) and the Midhaven (the Zodiac directly overhead at the time of birth) based on the sidereal time (or star time). These are then plotted on the chart and the houses can be assigned a Zodiac. The location of each planet is then calculated by referring to an ephemeris (or schedule of planetary locations) and plotted on the chart. For our purposes, these calculations do not need to be made for astrology to be useful. Most of us know our "sign" - the Sun Sign, or the sign the Sun was in at the time of their birth.

Now, the reason I went into so much detail is to explain the relationships of the signs a little more clearly. Once planets are plotted on the chart, geometric relationships are drawn between the various planets and interpretations are made based on these relationships. We can use those geometric relationships with Sun Sign astrology as well.


- Trine planets or signs separated by 120° on the birth chart; when connected, the trines create a triangle
- Sextile planets or signs separated by 60° on the birth chart; when connected, the sextiles create a hexagon
- Opposition these planets or signs are opposites; 180° on the birth chart
- Squares planets or signs separated by 90° on the birth chart; when connected, the squares create a square

• Semi-sextile – planets or signs separated by 30° on the birth chart; these signs are adjacent to each other in the chart; this relationship is, technically, the weakest rela-

tionship within a birth chart

There are other relationships, but as the distance between the planets or signs get more obscure, the harmonic vibrations get weaker. Therefore, the relationships tend to be more difficult to manage. This doesn't necessarily mean that all is lost. We just need to remember that these rockier relationships will need more nurturing than some of the other astrological relationships.

Ironically, my three favorite people in the whole world are Leos. Since I am a Cancer, this means that our natural relationship is a Semi-sextile relationship. While these relationships may take extra work, being a Cancer, I also don't mind having a very close-knit group of friends who understand and accept me for who I am.



Next month, I hope to finish this great series on using astrology in our families. We will discuss how the ruling planets and ruling elements of the Sun Sign affect the relationships. We'll finish the series with some suggestions on cooling fiery moments and techniques for applying your new knowledge to your family management.

Bringing the Faith to Your Special Needs Child

Sharing your Pagan faith with your children can sometimes seem daunting, especially if one of those children has special needs. First and foremost, remember that you are the best parent and teacher for your child. As the mother of a special needs child I often have to re-think the way I am conveying a message. Each month a different segment of our faith will be presented with ways to convey to your child. While I will give suggestions for ways to convey meanings, in the end, it is you the parent, who knows which ways work best for your child.

Samhain: Celebrating the Season With Your Special Pagans

Samhain is a special time of year. It is a time to remember our dearly departed friends and family, as well as the final turn of the Wheel. As Pagans, this is one of our most sacred of holidays. Apart from the commercialism and media stereotypes of the season, it is our duty to instill in our children the true reason for this season. Of course, our Special Pagans may require more special attention and time.

At this time of year, neighborhoods are full of Halloween decorations, kids are all geared up for a night of candy, bars have bus loops, orchards are offering corn mazes to go through, and the list goes on. Take the time to sit down with your Special Pagans, or all of your children for that matter, and really explain what this holiday means to your family, as Pagans.

Tell them the story of origin of the jack o' lantern, and how originally turnips were carved versus pumpkins. After the story, take a trip to the store and pick up a turnip or two and help your child to make his or her own face carving. For the younger ones, or those that can't use tools for carving, have them make their own from construction paper. Either allow them to make and cut out their own shapes for face carvings, or, for those whose manual dexterity does not allow for that, cut out several different shapes for the faces. Have fun gluing them and them put them up for display. Remind your children of the story while making either craft. Another idea is to go to a pumpkin patch itself to let them experience picking and bringing it home.

Spend time going through old photo albums, baby books, scrapbooks, etc. with your Special Pagan. If you have albums with pictures from when you were little (or even your parents), show them the progression of birth to death. Explain how even their grandparents were little once. Show them pictures of family, friends or pets that have passed. Explain that while they are physically no longer with us, their memories and spirits are very much alive. Talk about this being a time of remembrance of those that have passed on. Of course, be cognizant of your children's emotions. Death is nothing to fear. It is, after all, just another part of the circle of life. Take this time to construct a family tree as far back as you can go with as many pictures, or copies of pictures, as you have available. Another alternative is to put together a picture book with your Special Pagan of special memories and times with those who have departed. From the very first pet that you owned, to pictures of grandparents, great aunts and the like, help your child fill this book as well as leave blank pages in the back. If the album is small enough, it can even be placed on the altar at this time each year as a special way of honoring those who have gone before us.

However you decide to celebrate and honor this season, be sure that your child understands that there is no need for fear. Our dearly departed are all around and always with us.

Patience: A Gift From the Gods

Dictionary.com defines patience as "the capacity to accept or tolerate delay, trouble, or suffering without getting angry or upset." Personally speaking, in the life of those with Special Pagans, I define patience as a gift from the Gods. As children, we were told by our parents that patience was a virtue. It was needed when we were taken somewhere when we would rather have been outside playing. It was a must when an Aunt would show up from out of town and pinch your cheeks. Patience was most certainly needed when we were kids having to deal with the wacky adult world, and that hasn't changed now that we ARE the adults in the wacky world.

As a parent of a Special Pagan, you can not make it through a day without patience. There are things we special needs parents go through that no one else in the world feels. Not only do we need to have patience in dealing with whatever is thrown at us, but we have our children's needs to work with and, for many of us, an IEP team to deal with. We always seem to have more on our plates than most, but by remaining calm and being patient, we not only keep our energies low, we also teach that same level of patience to our children.

Don't get me wrong, we all have our days. I have five children, one of which has special needs. My sister has told countless people she has no idea how I do it, other than to say I have the patience of a Goddess. I may have that level of patience and tolerance, but get me on a bad day, or come at me from the wrong angle, and the wrath is soon to follow. Not quite the example I want to show my children. And I wasn't born with a high level of patience either. I asked for it. I can remember for months saying each night as I went to bed, "Please grant me the patience to get through tomorrow." It must have worked. I really am one of the most patient people I know.

To find the level of patience needed, you must find that happy medium; that fine line between your feelings and the needs of the person on the other end. I have found that in the best of situations, or the worst, by waiting things out they work out. It can be very nerve-wracking, but it's a great lesson in patience for you. The hardest thing is to think before reacting. If you stop yourself and ask, "Is this worth getting upset over? Rushing? Screaming?" etc, you may find that it is truly better to respond as calmly as possible. A prime example, that has nothing to do with special needs, is what happened last night. My five year-old daughter decided she would cut her 21 month-old brother's hair while I was occupied in the bathroom. She was quite proud of her work, while I completely lost it and had a mini-freak out. Not the most appropriate response, but I quickly composed myself, took a few breaths and calmly told her that while her behavior didn't please me, hair grows back and I would just have to wait for it to come back in. Of course, I did save those beautiful curls. I figured, if anything, I never know when I might need them for a spell.

Communication breakdown can be the biggest wearing down of patience. Whether your Special Pagan is having an "off day" or you are frustrated by the teachers at school who aren't following your child's IEP, take a moment to step back and pull yourself away from the situation. Take several deep breaths. If dealing with your Special Pagan, invite them to breathe with you. It is amazing what several deep, meditative breaths can do for your state of mind as well as your child. I use this with all of my children and it works wonderfully. Once you have mentally re-grouped, mull things over. Unless it's of dire urgency to fix right then and there, waiting and mulling it over, or doing at a slower pace may be the right answer.

Whatever you do, just remember that being calm and patient will not only help you, but help the people around you. If you feel yourself slipping and losing that ability to be patient, just take those long, deep, meditative breaths. You will recenter and feel well grounded. In the end, patience will guide you a long way.

Insomnia

Insomnia affects millions of people each year. It can cause problems like excessive sleepiness, fatigue, trouble staying focused or thinking clearly, feeling depressed or irritable, and memory problems. Women are twice as likely as men to have difficulties falling asleep, or staying asleep. Usually, younger women sleep soundly, but some women have sleeping issues throughout a large portion of their lives.

* Adults still need 7 to 8 hours of sleep every day*

There a quite a few factors that can affect a women's sleep. Some of them include: changes in hormonal levels, stress, lifestyle, illness, poor sleep environment, pregnancy and PMS.

Good sleep habits or sleep hygiene can improve your chances of restful sleep. Here are a few tips that you can implement on your own.

- · Try to go to sleep at the same time each night, and get up at the same time each morning. Try not to take naps during the day, because naps may make you less sleepy at night.
- · Avoid caffeine, nicotine, and alcohol late in the day. Caffeine and nicotine are stimulants and can keep you from falling asleep. Alcohol can cause waking in the night and interferes with sleep quality.
- · Don't eat a heavy meal late in the day. A light snack before bedtime, however, may help you sleep.
- · Make your bedroom comfortable. Be sure that it is dark, quiet, and not too warm or too cold. If light is a problem, try a sleeping mask. If noise is a problem, try earplugs, a fan, or a "white noise" machine to cover up the sounds.
- · Follow a routine to help you relax before sleep. Read a book, listen to music, or take a bath
- · Avoid using your bed for anything other than sleep. Don't eat, talk on the phone, watch TV or read in bed.
- · If you can't fall asleep after 30 minutes and don't feel drowsy, get up, go into another room. Read or do something that is not overly stimulating until you feel sleepy. But, you should wait at least 20 minutes from the time you got up before going back to bed. Do this as many times as you need to until you fall asleep.
- · If you find yourself lying awake worrying about things, try making a to-do list before you go to bed. This may help you to not focus on those worries overnight
- · Wear comfortable, loose-fitting clothes to bed
- · Get adequate exposure to bright light during the day
- · Keeping a sleep diary can help you identify patterns and conditions that may be affecting your sleep

Moms need to take care of their health too. October is breast cancer awareness month. Use this focus to schedule a breast exam, as well as being tested for ovarian cancer. Both cancer types have low symptoms, but can be treated if caught early.

Sleep Pillow

Stuff a small pillow with the following herb mixture. Sleep with it tucked into your pillowcase, close to your head.

1 part dried hops 1 part dried roses 1 part dried chamomile

1 part dried lavender

1-2 drops lavender oil

* For vivid dreams add an equal amount of mugwort to the mixture

The next time you are blessed with a gift from the Gods, accept it with an open heart, and remember to give gratitude for the gifts given. Think about the last time you were gifted by the Gods. How did you feel about the situation? Did you remember to say thank you? If you forgot, it's not too late to say thank you.

When Renzolla arrives at the King's Palace, he locks her in the tower. She behaves rather badly, but the lizard still helps her. Why, because she loves Renzolla just like a parent loves a child. Sometimes kids (even grownups) mess up and need to be forgiven. Admitting you made a mistake does not make you weak. In fact, it takes a strong person to admit they messed up. The next time you make a mistake, be upfront with it and think of how you can either fix what happened or make it right. You may be surprised by the gratitude of others for your honesty. Ask your parent to save you some dryer lint. Use the dryer lint to make as sculpture of what you think the Lizard Goddess looked like. You can also make the other characters from the story. Or, you could make a God/Goddess statue for your alter. Just remember that dryer lint can catch fire, so keep it away from candles and flames.

Towards the end of the story, Renzolla meets an old man who shows her what she really looks like. Why do you think no one else told Renzolla how she looked? Do you think it was because everyone was happy they did not have a goat face? Sometimes we are grateful for not being the unfortunate one. When we find ourselves in the situation where we are grateful because "its not me", make sure you also remember the good fortune you do have and if possible share your good fortune with others.

After reading this story, think about some of the things the Gods have given you that you are grateful for. Make a special Thank You Card. Look for things around the house or outside to use to make your Thank You Card to the Gods. Do not buy anything new to use in making your card. Only use things you already have at home or outside. If you use nature items, be sure to either use items that have already fallen. If you absolutely must use a live nature item, make sure you thank the giver and leave some type of offering. When you are finished with your card it can be placed on your altar.

Class 3 The Goat-Faced Girl

The Grey Fairy Book by: Andrew Lang Lesson: Remember to show gratitude

Mirror, Mirror

The mirror can be a very powerful magickal tool that all small children should have on hand. Take the time to pick out a mirror that looks special to you or seems to make you think you should have it. Once you get a mirror that 'fits or 'calls' to you, add your own decorations to it. Be sure the decorations show or represent you. Paint the handle, add ribbons, hearts, feathers, bows, dried herbs or flowers, rope, arrowheads or rocks and anything else that you feel fits you.

A mirror can be a wonderful thing to have on hand. It is important that you take out your mirror on a regular basis. Follow the steps below, using a mirror anytime you feel things are not right, or make a regular ritual of them.

- 1. Take out the mirror and face it away from you. Clear your mind of all things that are around you.
- 2. Turn the mirror towards you and tell it to give you insight to how you are. You can write a small saying to use for this, or you can just word it however you feel is right each time you use it.
- 3. Look deep into the mirror at your face. During this procedure, there may come a time when you no longer see anything; thoughts will take over. If these times come, do not worry about them and never try to snap yourself out of what you are doing so that you can see your face again.
- 4. Play back the things that stand out in your mind that has happened since the last time you used the mirror. It will be like watching a movie, but will seem like a rerun.
- 5. As you watch your 'movie', pay attention to the things you did and said. If you did things that you are proud of do not hold them in your mind. If you have done things that you feel you shouldn't have, hold them in your thoughts.
- 6. When your movie finishes, and no more images or thoughts come to your mind, focus into the mirror again and look at yourself.
- 7. In your head, go over the things that you held in your mind. Determine what you did that you didn't like, or how you acted that was not proper for that moment, and make a silent promise to yourself to work on not doing that again. Make an outward plan if you feel that you need to apologize to someone or write a thank you note.
- 8. Look into your eyes and remember how you love yourself, and how you are great on the inside. Be sure to smile. Only wonderful people take time to reflect and look into their own mirrors.
 - * This exercise is a great one, and can be used throughout life's journey; even in adulthood!

Keep your mirror in a private place and be sure not to tell many of your secret rituals with it!

Teaching Lessons

Materials:

Grapes (cherry tomatoes, candy pieces, or other small snack)

Container to put them in

Procedure:

Place the treats in a container located in a mutual spot. Each time appreciation isn't shown for anything done for you, who ever you didn't show appreciation to will be allowed to take an item out of the jar and eat it. If you aren't shown appreciation when needed, you will be the one pulling a treat from the container.

At the end of the day, have a discussion with those involved in the game. Talk about how you feel when a simple 'thank you' did not come your way. Discuss the times when it is appropriate, and the feelings that come behind it.

Feel free to play this game often, or with different people. Eventually, you will be the one with all the treats and aware of great manners.

Lesson: Falsely using your influences will cause a mirror effect

Being a Pagan Human

We are all human, which means we live with tons of emotions and feelings. These human traits are not a stable part of you and will come and go more than the hours of a day.

As a human, you train yourself to work through everything that comes across your path. A mistake that many make is using their religion and beliefs as an aid to overcome these emotions and feelings. Religion does have a place in handling things of 'human nature'. Religion and beliefs are not to be used just to benefit your emotions, but can be used as a positive tool to aid you in finding your own way to overcome or handle them.

You will need to work with the things that human life throws your way in a positive way, one that will not bring more problems your way or lessen your relationship with your path.

Since emotions are the focus in the story, why not use them to practice how to properly use religion and beliefs to aid human traits? Observe yourself for a week. Each day, write down an emotion that you had that day, why you felt it, and how you handled it.

When you have completed this task, take a look at your list and circle the times that you did not handle the situation as a good Pagan should. Take some time reading handy materials, past issues of Pagan Moonbeams, and talking to a Pagan that you admire to see if there were other ways you could have handled the situation using your chosen path.

Write the emotions that you felt and explain the proper way to handle them in your journal. Try to read that list at least once a week until you are so familiar with the words that you don't need to read them. As situations come up that address the things you have documented in your journal, see if you can handle them in a more positive Pagan way.

You can use the procedure here with any other problem that you feel you are mixing your religious path with your human traits. Once you learn how to properly handle things that come your way, you will receive the best gift ever, the gift of true peace.

If nothing else, remember to use beliefs as an aid, not a tool, to overcome things that come to you and prove hard to handle. Remember that you are to become strong within for both your chosen path and for yourself. The best trait of any Pagan is their strength!

Back At You

There are many ways to say and believe that things always come back to you. In the Pagan realm, they are sometimes called Karma or Fate. No matter the wording, there is most certainly a belief that we should all do our best to ensure that things are done so they don't come back to us in one form or another.

Sometimes, seeing is believing. Can you think of someone that causes ill-will on another? Did you see where later this seemed to come back to them in the same way or, sometimes in a stronger way? I am sure if you think hard enough you will see that this has happened not only to them but to you as well. It doesn't have to be something bad that comes back; good will do the same loop. Do some thinking using the same method described above but with positive things.

Talk to your parents and friends about this topic. You are sure to find many different views and beliefs that surround it. Keep a graph or diary of your findings and see how the answers you found compare.

After reading the story several times, do some meditating on the lesson that is given in the story. Talk to your parent or adult Pagan guide to understand more the belief that surround the topic of the lesson. After spending some time alone with the information you have gathered, come to an understanding on this topic with yourself. This small lesson could be a large step within your own path and life.

Class 3 The Jogi's Punishment

The Lilac Fairy Book by: Andrew Lang

Lesson: Falsely using your influences will cause a mirror effect

The lesson for this story, the mirror effect, also applies to what the princess did. She used her title to get the Jogi to meet with her, even though she knew this was not ok with her father. (This does not create an excuse for the Jogi's actions) Even though the princess went against her father's wishes, she should have told him the truth about what she did. It may have prevented the events that happened after.

Using the trust of your parents to get away with naughty actions is just as wrong as using your influence to affect a situation. Both actions will invoke the Law of Karma. And just because you can get away with it does not mean you should try. In the world of pagans and witches, "Trust" is very important, and so is your word. And even if you think your parents may not notice, the Gods do. Trying to trick the Gods will make your magic less powerful. The last thing any pagan child wants is to lose the trust of their parents and pagan family.

At the end of the story, the prince and princess knew that the monkey would hurt the Jogi when he opened the chest. This brings up another point of view of Karma. Was it ok for the prince and princess to defend themselves, by harming the Jogi? This is a question that is the center of many discussions. What is the right thing to do? Do we have to allow people to harm us? Use this lesson to discuss these questions with your parent or adult pagan leader, or both. This lesson does not only apply to the magickal world, but to everyday life. Talk about the ways magick and non-magick people defend themselves. What should you do in situations where you feel the need to defend yourself? And how that will cause a mirror effect? The Law of Harm None includes you. You do not have to let others harm you. And causing harm as a form of defense is not always the answer, but that does not mean that a wrong should go un-punished. All this seems kind of confusing, I know. Sometimes it is confusing for adults too. But knowing how to handle situations, and knowing what your best options are, is a great way of being prepared and making the best decisions.

On the previous page you were asked to write down your emotions and how they related to events in your life. Pick one of the situations that you really feel bad about and wish you would have handled differently. Create a "Mirror Effect" coupon for the situation. On it, write down the positive effect you are going to create to make up for the bad feeling you had from the situation. Be as creative as you like with your coupon and the effect. When you are finished, give the coupon to your parent or adult pagan leader and discuss the "Mirror Effect" coupon and the situation. Decide on the best way to cash in your coupon.

Another way to realize the effects of our actions is with water. Try to find a pond or lake. A large puddle will even work. The water needs to be still. Find a small rock or piece of wood and throw it in the water. What happened? Think about how the same action can affect your life and the people around you. Make notes in your journal or diary about what you saw and how it made you feel.

Ask your parent if they have a mirror you can use for a while, one that you can carry around with you. For a least a week, look at everything around you through the mirror. Document how everything looks in the mirror. Are there

things you noticed in the mirror that you never noticed before? If you have a few mirrors, you can set them up at angles facing each other and see the effect of infinity. After your time with the mirror, think about how



sometimes things look different in the mirror. This also applies to life and the return of Karma. It may not come back in the way we think it will. Also, the way we see our own actions is not always the ways others see them.

Book Classs By TristÅ Tools of the Trade Class #3

Parents Note: Classes are written to the children in case they are taking them as a self-directed course. All important parent notes are written in italics to be noticed easily; if child is taking class themselves, after reading, it would be best to use white-out or marker to cover them up. The material in each class, even if the child is learning on their own, should have some kind of addition or guidance from you; this will add to or begin the Pagan bond and religious relaxation opening between the two of you.

Each class will be broken down into weeks, usually 4 per month but can be done as you have time or see fit. Great effort will be taken to supply each lesson with vocabulary, assignments, enhancements, and with Pagan specific topics (obstacles, interaction, etiquette, values, etc..). Although not specified in each and every lesson, students are to use their notebooks to document, do assignments, and to use as a journal. The same notebook should be used to write down any questions that they have during each class, which are to be answered by you before going on to the next lesson. If research is needed to answer them, allow your child to accompany you in doing so; this will make it easier for them to do it on their own later.

Although classes are presented in a 'formal' way, present and hold them in a very informal way, keeping the relaxing environment that should be present in all things Pagan. Some added touches to the class would be; to hold it outside, indoors in your pajamas, reading by candlelight, holding class during special times of the day like sunrise and sunset, or any other way that works for you and your child. It is suggested that you read through each lesson before presenting it; as with all things you may wish to omit things due to personal belief or views.

Week 1 - Bell

All - Read Bell pgs 47-64

Study Terms: clapper, visualize, cleansing, practitioners, shapes, designs

The bell is a diverse instrument, as well as an ancient one. It can be used in many ways throughout your Pagan lifestyle. It is important to know these uses, as well as try them all at least once to see where they fit into your own life. Understand that the vibes it produces brings an energy all it's own that can be a contribution to all that you do.

Assignment Prep: (Class A) make a list of all bell instruments, or, (Class B) make a list and do research on uses of each thing on your list.

Assignment: Make or remake a bell or bell instrument of your own. Choose materials and tools carefully and try to connect with them, as well. Meditate and/or connect with each material and step that is used to make it. Add in personal and/or path specific

Assignment Follow-Up: Take a look at other bells at a new age store or those belonging to other people. Decide whether making a bell is more meaningful than those that can be found in other places. Make an entry in your notebook as to your findings.

Class A & B - Spend some time with the bell or bell instrument that you made, as well as others that you are able to see or work with. Pay special attention to the actual sounds they make. Close your eyes and connect with them, allowing the sound to take over. Try this exercise with different bell instruments, and with those of different materials. See the effect and feeling that each of them bring to you. Keep really good notes in your notebook on these experiments. Be sure that these notes are taken into consideration when you begin to get a bell for your own uses. Remember that even though the bell may not be a tool in the things you do, it can also be used as an aid for you to get in the right state of mind or conscience easily.

^{*} Parents: you may need to aid in the study of bell instruments with your child. There are many that are used for non-Pagan religions and a lot of digging will have to happen for them to get to the Pagan uses of the individual instruments.

Book Classs By TristÅ Tools of the Trade Class #3

Week 2 - Besom

All - Read Bell pgs 65-76 & Feb issue of first year Pagan Moonbeams pg. 19

Study Terms: Adornment, Cleansing, Mundane, Visualize, Unwanted, Symbolic, Virtually

A besom is a wonderful tool to use to prepare and cleanse your area you use for ritual. Imagine it brushing away all the 'clutter' that is in the way of your concentration, hindering the work you want to accomplish, and preparing the path for the spirits to enter. Although the besom is not a major tool in some paths, knowledge of it should be known by all Pagans. (Intro written by Rhiannon Swanshadow)

Assignment Prep: Although there are many different purposes for the besom, the reason it is most used has to do with energy. Because of this reason, when making or choosing your own, it is important that your energy, mixed with the broom's energy, may have an effect on the effectiveness of the besom. Purchase a cheap broom at a craft store or at the dollar store, similar to the ones that can be found during Halloween in the US.

Assignment: You will take the purchased broom apart and make your own besom from it several times throughout the month. Compose the besom during different natural times of the day (night, day, sunset, sunrise, high noon, high midnight, etc...), use different adornments and explore different ways to assemble it. Class B, you may want to also assure to be in different moods or spiritual stages when making it. Be sure to use your besom to rid of energies before breaking it down and using again. You may want to write in your notebook your feelings, emotions, and spiritual state you had before, during and after each make and use session. Indicating the procedure and time of day used would also be of help.

Assignment Follow-Up: Determine the best time, procedure, state of mind and spiritual state for you to make your own besom ,from the findings in the assignment.

* Parents you may need to be available to help determine the timing and personal states they are in when doing this project.

Class A & B - choose one of the assignments below to explore on your own. Be sure to use the internet, local Pagans, new age store, and any other resource when doing your research. During, and especially after your research, write in your notebook.

- 1. What are some of the tools a besom can stand in for? How do you feel about specific tools being used as a stand in for others? When is this acceptable to you? When is this not acceptable for you?
- 2. What is your opinion of connecting things to your besom? How would you decide where to put it, and how to affix it?
- 3. Once you have made a tool and have totally connected it to you, how important is it that others do not touch it? How would you protect it? Clean it? Place it?

Week 3 - Cauldron

All - Read pages 115 - 132

Study Terms: Depiction, Symbology, Durable

The cauldron is one of the older tools that have been used for magickal and symbolic uses. It's appearance and uses bring a piece of the ancestors into the work or works that it is present in. Although there are many uses for the cauldron that are very powerful, using it for heating is the most natural. The material that the cauldron is made from will usually set the mood and control the uses of it. If using this tool, it is important that you choose it well.

Assignment: Do individual research on the materials listed in the book; both locally and online. Pay attention to the look, feel, and energy you get from each of them, as well as its magickal properties. Take your time and use as many resources as you can find. Be sure to keep track of your actions in your notebook.

Week 3 - Cauldron...cont.

* Parents: a great addition to this class would be for you, or someone you know, to hold a small demonstration or workshop on using the cauldron

Class A & B - Pick four paths you are fairly familiar with in the Pagan realm. Do a little research into them and decide what they could use the cauldron for. If they do not actively list this tool on the list of supplies used, find a use for the tool in a ritual or ceremony. Be sure to keep notes of your adventure in your notebook. When done, list at least two (Class A) or four (Class B) uses that you feel could be something you could relate to in your own Pagan practice.

Week 4 - Book of Shadows

All - Read pages 77 - 92 in the book

Study Terms: Abbreviated, Chronicle, Enlightenment, Grimoires, Impromptu, Incantations, Initiate, Solitaries,

Whether it is called a book of shadows, magickal journal, or diary, it will be the window to your personal magickal world. It will hold the lessons you learned, as well as your feelings, while it shows how you grow into a great Pagan. The BOS tool will become the stepping stone for you to make magick and Paganism a personal thing. As you mold into your own style of Pagan, this book will be the most used one you own. When you are a seasoned Pagan, you will find yourself continually looking into this book for many reasons.

Assignment Prep: Reread the section of the book that talks about the BOS blessing, its purpose, and understand how the one in the book was prepared by looking at all the angles that are connected with the words that make it up.

Assignment: Write your own blessing for you BOS or journal. Determine the procedure that will be used when you do your blessing. Ask a parent to oversee you operate your blessing from the sidelines, and offer suggestions once it is done. If you already have a BOS or journal and have blessed it, adjust the blessing you write now to renew the blessing or do a different kind of blessing for it.

Assignment Follow-Up: Although not required, feel free to rewrite the blessing or re-think the procedure used to better it. Take into consideration how you felt, the energy that was present, and the comments of your parent (if it was given) when reworking it.

* Parents: aid your child in deciding what actually will go into their BOS or journal. The assignment suggests that you watch a blessing from the sidelines; however, if you, or the student are uncomfortable with this, it is not necessary. If you do attend this blessing, your student will want some impartial input from you; be sure that it is onset, impartial, and contains some positive feedback. Remember that this will be the basis for them writing and performing blessings in the future, so be sure the Pagan basics are there. Make sure, somewhere along the way, to pose the question: Do you feel that spells, incantations, or blessings should be included in your BOS or journal? This question may be the start of you aiding them to find answers, be sure you are helping without influencing the outcome.

Class A & B - If you do not have a type of BOS, follow the steps below. If you do have one, read the steps below, and then decide if you plan to change something about it, or, if you plan to change things from how you have them now, that you have more information.

- 1. Make a list of the things you would want to be included in your type of BOS.
- 2. Separate the list into like-topics to determine how many physical books will be needed.
- 3. Write an ideal plan of materials and types of adornments you would use for each to fit their purpose.
- 4. Follow your plan to make the first set-up plan for your documented Pagan journey. Remember that you may change the information and/or how things are done as years pass. The important thing is to get a good start.
 - * Be sure to take all areas discussed in the book and your experiences here, as well as your guides advice, into consideration!
